#### NOTE 1 – BACKGROUND AND NATURE OF OPERATIONS

JRF Outreach (JRF) was established to serve the at-risk youth in the Monroe, LA southside community, which is the most impoverished area in the city of Monroe. The organization works to support the area youth and young adults by providing assistance with the necessary educational, financial, emotional, and psychological services that they may not otherwise have access to.

#### **NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES**

#### Principles of Accounting

JRF financial statements are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting, whereby revenue is recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when incurred.

#### Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

#### Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of the statement of cash flows, JRF considers all highly liquid debt instruments purchased with a maturity of three months or less redeemable without penalty for the early withdrawal, to be cash. JRF maintains, at a financial institution, cash which may exceed federally insured amounts at times.

#### Income Taxes

JRF has been determined to be tax exempt under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. Therefore, no provision for income taxes is made in the accompanying financial statements.

#### **Financial Statement Presentation**

In accordance with the provisions of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) as set forth in FASB ASC 958, which established standards for external financial reporting by not-for-profit organizations, JRF classifies resources for accounting and reporting purposes into two net asset categories which are without donor restrictions and with donor restrictions. A description of these two net asset categories is as follows:

#### Financial Presentation (Continued)

- Net assets without donor restrictions include funds not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. The revenues received and expenses incurred in conducting the mission of JRF are included in this category. JRF has determined that any donor-imposed restrictions for current or developing programs and activities are generally met within the operating cycle of JRF and therefore, their policy is to record those net assets as without donor restrictions. On December 31, 2023, JRF had \$16,938 in net assets without donor restrictions.
- Net assets with donor restrictions include funds that are subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates those resources be maintained in perpetuity. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both. When a restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. At December 31, 2023, JRF had no net assets with donor restrictions.

#### Revenue Recognition

Contributions, including promises to give, are considered conditional or unconditional, depending on the nature and existence of any donor or grantor conditions. A contribution or promise to give contains a donor or grantor condition when both of the following are present:

- An explicit identifying of a barrier, which is more than trivial, must be overcome before the revenue can be earned and recognized.
- An implicit right of return of assets transferred or a right of release of a donor or grantor's obligation to transfer assets promised if the condition is not met.

Unconditional contributions or conditional contributions in which the conditions have been substantially met or explicitly waived by the donor are recorded as revenue with or without donor restrictions, depending on the existence and nature of any donor restrictions. When a restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the consolidated statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Conditional contributions are recognized when the barriers to entitlement are overcome, and the promises become unconditional. Unconditional contributions are recognized as revenue when received. Grants are either recorded as contributions or exchange transactions based on criteria contained in the grant award. Exchange transactions are reimbursed based on a predetermined rate for services performed. The revenue is recognized in the period the service is performed.

#### Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing various programs and supporting services have been reported on a functional basis in the statements of functional expenses. Expenses that are identified with a specific program or support service are charged directly according to the natural classification. Other shared costs have been allocated among the various programs and supporting services based on usage or other estimates made by management.

#### **NOTE 3 – GRANT REVENUE**

Grant revenue includes funding from state sources, as well as several private funding sources. Grant revenue consists of the following at December 31, 2023:

Independent Accountant's Report on Applying Agreed-Upon Procedures

To JRF Outreach, Inc. and the Louisiana Legislative Auditor:

We have performed the procedures enumerated below, which were agreed to by JRF Outreach and the Louisiana Legislative Auditor (the specified parties), on the Agency's compliance with certain laws and regulations contained in the accompanying Louisiana Attestation Questionnaire during the fiscal year ended December 31, 2023, as required by Louisiana Revised Statute 24:513 and the *Louisiana Governmental Audit Guide*. The Agency's management is responsible for its financial records and compliance with applicable laws and regulations. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of the specified parties. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures enumerated below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

The procedures and associated findings are as follows:

#### Federal, State, and Local Awards

Results: We randomly selected six disbursements from each grant program administered during the fiscal year by the Agency. There was one grant, so we selected a total of six transactions.

Results: We obtained supporting documentation for each of the six disbursements selected in Procedure 2. The amount and payee in the supporting documentation agreed for each disbursement.

4. Report whether the selected disbursements were coded to the correct fund and general ledger account.

Results: Each of the disbursements we were provided supporting documentation for were coded to the correct fund and general ledger account.

5. Report whether the selected disbursements were approved in accordance with the Agency's policies and procedures.

Results: The selected disbursements were approved in accordance with the Agency's policies and procedures.

6. For each selected disbursement made for federal grant awards, obtain the Compliance Supplement for the applicable federal program. Results: We compared documentation for each of the selected disbursements with program compliance requirements related to eligibility. No exceptions were noted.

#### Reporting

Results: We compared documentation for each of the selected disbursements with program compliance requirements related to reporting. No exceptions were noted.

Results: We obtained the closeout reports for both the Act 170 of 2022, and LYFE grants. We compared the reports to the Agency's financial records including financial statements and budgets. There were no material differences noted on the closeout reports for the Act 170 of 2022 grant.

The cost control reports for the LYFE grant program did not report accurate cumulative expenses on a month-to-month basis. We calculated the total monthly expenses listed on each cost control report for January through December 2023 and compared it to the total expenses reported on the agency's financial statements. We determined that the differences were not material.
