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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

To the Board of Directors of New Orleans Municipal Yacht Harbor Management Corporation (A Proprietary Component Unit of the City of New Orleans) New Orleans, Louisiana

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the business-type activities of **New Orleans Yacht Harbor Management Corporation** ("**MYHMC**"), a proprietary component unit of the City of New Orleans, as of and for the year ended December 31, 2022, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise **MYHMC's** basic financial statements as listed in the foregoing table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of **MYHMC** as of December 31, 2022 and the changes in financial position and cash flows thereof for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of **MYHMC** and to meet our other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about **MYHMC's** ability to continue as a going concern for twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditors' Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards*, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of **MYHMC's** internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about **MYHMC's** ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the managements' discussion and analysis on pages 4 to 9 and the required pension information on pages 25 and 26 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to

our inquiries, the basic financial statements and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Report on Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise **MYHMC's** basic financial statements. The accompanying schedule of Compensation, Benefits and Other Payments to the Agency Head is presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated June 22, 2023, on our consideration of **MYHMC's** internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of **MYHMC's** internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering **MYHMC's** internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS For the Year Ended December 31, 2022

As the financial manager of the New Orleans Municipal Yacht Harbor Management Corporation (MYHMC) (A Proprietary Component Unit of the City of New Orleans), we offer the readers of the attached financial statements this narrative overview and analysis of the financial activities of MYHMC for the year ended December 31, 2022. This discussion and analysis are designed to assist the reader in focusing on the significant financial issues and activities and to identify and significant change in MYHMC's financial position. We encourage readers to consider the information presented here in conjunction with the financial statement as a whole.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

MYHMC's financial statements are comprised of the basic financial statements and the notes to the financial statements. Since MYHMC's consists of a single enterprise fund, no fund level financial statements are shown.

BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The basic financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of MYHMC's finances in a manner similar to a private-sector business.

The statement of net position present information on all MYHMC's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of MYHMC's is improving or deteriorating. Net position increases when revenues exceed expenditures. Increases to assets without a corresponding increase to liabilities results in increased net position which indicates an improved financial position.

The statements of revenues, expenditures and changes in net position present information showing how MYHMC's net position changed during the fiscal year, all changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event occurs, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenditures are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods (e.g., earned but unused vacation leave).

The cash flows statements show how MYHMC's changes in net position affects cash and cash equivalents, and breaks the analysis down to operating, investing, and financing activities. The statements capture both the current operating results and the accompanying changes in net position. The cash flows statements include only inflows and outflows of cash and cash equivalents.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS For the Year Ended December 31, 2022

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provides in the basic financial statement.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- MYHMC's assets and deferred outflows of resources exceeded liabilities and deferred inflows of resources by \$4,000,838 as of December 31, 2022; an increase of \$468,973 in 2022. The unrestricted net position was \$2,761,808 at December 31, 2022.
- Total assets increased by \$12,734,702 from 2021 to 2022. The net increase in assets was primarily due to MYHMC adopting GASB 87, lessor accounting. MYHMC, as lessor of boathouse and slip leases, recognized leases receivable of \$12,241,973 at December 31, 2022 for lease terms in excess of one (1) year.
- On January 1, 2022, MYHMC adopted GASB 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions. Net pension liability, deferred outflows of pensions resources and deferred inflows of pensions resources in the amounts \$409,885, \$166,127 and \$86,214, respectively, were reported in the statement of net position as of December 31, 2022. No amounts for these classifications were reported in the statement of net position at December 31, 2021.
- The largest part of MYHMC's net position is held in cash and cash equivalents as the assets operated by MYHMC's are owned by the City of New Orleans and leased to MYHMC.
- The MYHMC's total net position at December 31, 2022 increased by \$468,973 or 13% from the net position as measured on December 31, 2021. Slip rental rates increased in 2022, therefore, slip revenue increased from approximately \$796,000 in 2021 to \$1,039,000 in 2022.
- Operating expenses increased by approximately \$302,000 or 30%. The major contributors to the increase in expenses were insurance costs and professional service costs in connection with the expanded offerings the MYHMC's had in 2022.

BUDGETARY HIGHLIGHTS

MYHMC's adopts an annual operating budget and an annual capital budget. The operating budget includes proposed expenditures and the means of financing them. MYHMC's operating budget remains in effect for the entire year.

CAPITAL ASSETS AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital assets, net of depreciation was \$1,239,030 as of December 31, 2022. Capital assets consist of the following at December 31:

The renovations to the MYHMC as a result of the damage made by Hurricanes Katrina and Isaac continue. Infrastructure leasehold improvements totaled \$6,610 for the year ended December 31, 2022. Depreciation expense was \$35,985 and \$24,534 for the years ended December 31, 2022 and 2021, respectively.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND A LOOK AT NEXT YEAR

MYHMC expects to continue generating most of its revenues through rental of slips and boathouse in 2023. Boat slip occupancy should be steady in the mid 90% range due to standard slip turnover. Due to increased insurance and other operating costs a 15% slip rate increase has been implemented for year 2023.

The recreational marine industry is robust and being the only floating dock facility in the New Orleans area, demand for both permanent and transient dockage should continue to be strong.

During 2023 MYHMC expects continued capital expenditures for enhancements of the areas under MYHMC management including West End Park. The Boat Launch, The Point, and the Marina.

MYHMC plans to use positive cash flows of the entity to fund reserve accounts for dredging, insurance losses, and replacements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS December 31, 2022

Note 1 – Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Background

The New Orleans Municipal Yacht Harbor Management Corporation (MYHMC) was formed in 1972 by the City of New Orleans ("the City") to operate the Municipal Yacht Harbor in the manner comparable to that of a private business enterprise; to provide a safe and secure environment for recreational boating; to ensure that the cost associated with providing services to the general public are financed or recovered through user fees and charges; and to place an emphasis on generating a sufficient amount of net operating revenues to be used for maintenance and capital improvement projects.

The City has financial accountability because it appoints a voting majority of the Board and can impose its will on the organization. MYHMC is a non-profit corporation owned by the Mayor of the City of New Orleans and administered by a Board of Directors consisting of 11 members, 9 of which are appointed by the Mayor, subject to City Council approval, and are voting members. The other two members are from the City Council and are non-voting members.

General Data

As governing authority of Orleans Parish, for reporting purposes, the City is the financial reporting entity. The financial reporting entity consists of the primary government (the City of New Orleans), organizations for which the primary government is financially accountable, and other organizations for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the primary government are such that exclusion would cause the reporting entity's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete.

Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No.14, <u>The Financial Reporting Entity</u>, established criteria for determining which component units should be considered part of the City of New Orleans for financial reporting purposes. The basic criteria for including a potential component unit within the reporting entity is financial accountability.

These criteria include:

- 1. Appointing a voting majority of an organization's governing body, and
 - (a) the ability of the primary government to impose its will on that organization and/or;
 - (b) the potential to provide specific financial benefits to or impose specific financial burdens on that organization.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued) December 31, 2022

- 2. Organizations for which the reporting entity does not appoint a voting majority but are fiscally dependent on the reporting entity.
- 3. Organizations for which the reporting entity's financial statements would be misleading if data of the organization was not included.

Based on the above criteria, MYHMC is considered to be a component unit of the City of New Orleans, the financial reporting entity. The accompanying financial statements present information only on the funds maintained by MYHMC and do not present information on the City of New Orleans, the general government services provided by that governmental unit, or the other governmental units that comprise the financial reporting entity.

Basic of Presentation

MYHMC follows the provisions of Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement No. 34, "Basic Financial Statements – and Management Discussion and Analysis- for State and Local Governments." Statement No. 34 established standards for external financial reporting for all state and local governmental entities, which includes a statement of net position, a statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in net position, and a statement of cash flows. It requires the classification of net position into three components: invested in capital assets, net of related debt; restricted; and unrestricted.

These classifications are defined as follows:

Invested in capital assets, net of related debt - This component of net position consists of capital assets, including restricted capital assets, net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets. If there are significant unspent related debt proceeds at year-end, the portion of the debt attributable to the unspent proceeds are not included in the calculation of invested in capital assets, net of related debt. Rather, that portion of the debt is included in the same net position component as the unspent proceeds.

Restricted net position - This component of net position consists of constraints imposed by creditors (such as dept covenants), grantors, contributors, or laws or regulations of other governments or constraints imposed by law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.

Unrestricted net position - This component of net position consists of net position that do not meet the definition of "restricted" or "invested in capital assets, net of related debt."

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued) December 31, 2022

Basic of Accounting

The term basis of accounting is used to determine when a transaction or event is recognized on MYHMC's statement of revenues, expenses, and changes in net position. MYHMC used the full accrual basis of accounting.

Under this basis, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when incurred, even though actual payment or receipt may not occur until after the period ends.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

MYHMC is authorized under state law to deposit funds within a fiscal agent bank organized under the laws of the State of Louisiana, the laws of any other state in the Union, and the laws of the United States. MYHMC may also invest in U.S. Treasury securities and other evidence of indebtedness issued or guaranteed by federal agencies and time certificates of deposit with state banks organized under Louisiana law and national banks having their principal offices in Louisiana. Under state law, these deposits must be secured by federal deposit insurance or the pledge of securities owned by the fiscal agent bank. The market value of such pledged securities and federal deposit insurance must equal or exceed the amount on deposit with the fiscal agent.

The MYHMC's cash and cash equivalents are considered to be cash on hand, demand deposits. and short-term investments with original maturities of three months or less from the date of acquisition.

Accounts Receivable

It is the practice of management to provide an allowance for any account in which management's opinion may not be collected based upon a review of the current status of existing receivables. Accounts receivable are shown net of an allowance for uncollectible accounts of \$2,171 for the year ended December 31, 2022.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued) December 31, 2022

Capital Assets

Capital assets are carried at cost, if purchased or at fair market value at the date of the gift, if donated. Depreciation of capital assets is provided over the estimated useful lives of the assets using the straight-line method. Repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred. Expenditures that increase the value or productive capacity of assets are capitalized. When capital assets are retired, sold, or otherwise disposed of, the assets carrying amount and related accumulated depreciation are removed from the accounts and any gain or loss is included in operations.

<u>Leases</u>

For the year ended June 30, 2022, MYHMC implemented GASB Statement No. 87, *Leases*. MYHMC leases boat slips, boathouse property and commercial property to meet operational needs. For short-term leases with a maximum possible term of 12 months or less at commencement, MYHMC recognizes periodic revenue based on the provisions of the lease agreement. For agreements subject to GASB 87 where MYHMC is the lessor, MYHMC recognizes a lease receivable and a deferred inflows of resources, based on the present value of the future lease payments expected to be received over the term of the lease. Lease receivables are reduced by the principal portion of lease payments received, and deferred inflows of resources are amortized on a straight-line basis and recognized as revenue over the lease term. Lease payments included in the measurement of the lease receivable are comprised of fixed and fixed in-substance payments. The deferred inflows of resources are measured as the initial amount of the lease term. If amendments or other certain circumstances occur that are expected to significantly affect the amount of a lease, the present value is remeasured and corresponding adjustments made.

Annual and Sick Leave

Employees may accrue a maximum of 45 clays of annual leave and an unlimited number of days of sick leave. Upon termination of employment, an employee is paid for accrued annual leave based upon his or her current hourly rate of pay and for accrued sick leave on a formula basis. If termination is the result of retirement, the employee has the option of converting accrued leave to additional clays of service. Accrued leave as of December 31, 2022 \$116,909.

Income Taxes

MYHMC is owned by the Mayor of the City of New Orleans, and as such, no federal or state income taxes are assessed.

Date of Management's Review

Management has evaluated subsequent events through June 22, 2023, the date which the financial_statements were available to be issued.

Note 2 – Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents are included in the statement of net position in the amount of \$3,145,824 as of December 31, 2022

These deposits are stated at cost, which approximates market. Under state law, these deposits (or the resulting bank balances) must be secured by federal deposit insurance or the pledge of securities owned by the fiscal agent bank.

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a failure of financial institution or counterparty, MYHMC would not be able to recover its deposits, investments, or collateral securities that are in the possession of an outside party.

The market values of the pledged securities plus the federal deposit insurance must at all times equal the amount on deposit with the fiscal agent. These securities are held in the name of the pledging fiscal agent bank in a holding or custodial bank that is mutually acceptable to both parties.

As of December 31, 2022 MYHMC had \$3,145,824 in deposits (collected bank balances). December 31, 2022 bank balance of \$3,262,654 was covered by collateral held by the pledging banks' trust department or agent in MYHMC's name and \$250,000 was covered under federal depository insurance, in each year.

Depreciation expense for the year ended December 31, 2022 was \$35,985. On February I, 2019, MYHMC was granted possession of a Boathouse due to non-payment of rent. The Boathouse is included in the Capital assets of MYHMC at the insured cost of the boathouse, which approximates fair value.

Note 5 – Risk Management

MYHMC is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of; damage to and destruction of assets for which MYHMC carries commercial insurance. Liabilities are reported when it is probable that a loss has occurred and the amount of the loss can be reasonably estimated and the amount of the loss can be reasonably estimated. Management believes MYHMC has adequate insurance coverage.

Note 6 – Pension Plan

Plan Description:

The employees' retirement system of the City of New Orleans (the Plan) is a defined benefit pension plan established under the laws of the State of Louisiana. The City charter provided that the retirement ordinance (Chapter 114 of the code) continues to govern and control the retirement system under the management of the Board of Trustees.

Also, for changes in the retirement system by council action, subject to limitations for the purpose of providing retirement allowances, death, and disability benefits to all officers and employees of the parish, except those officers and employees who are already or may hereafter be included in the benefits of any other pension or retirement system of the city, the state, or any political subdivision of the state.

Regular Benefits

The following is a description of the plan and its benefits and is provided for general information purposes only. Participants should refer to the appropriate statutes for more complete information.

Employees with thirty (30) years of service, or who attain age 60 with ten (10) years of services, or age 65, irrespective of length of service, are entitled to a retirement allowance. The retirement allowance of an annuity, which is the actuarial equivalent of the employee's accumulation contribution, plus an annual pension, which together with the annuity, provides a total retirement allowance equal to 2.5% to 4% of average compensation times the number of years of service. The maximum pension may not exceed 100% of average compensation. Pension amounts are reduced for service retirement prior to age 62. Average compensation is defined average annual earned compensation for the highest sixty (60) successive months of service, less \$1,200. Mandatory retirement is 70.

Disability Benefits

Disability benefits are awarded to active members with 10 or more years of creditable service if a physician nominated by the board certifies that the member is totally incapacitated and that such incapacitation is likely to be permanent. The member receives an annuity, which is the actuarial equivalent to the employee's accumulated contribution, plus an annual pension, which, together with the annuity shall be 75% of the service allowance that would have been payable upon service retirement at age 65, had the member continued in service to the age of 65. Such allowance is to be computed on the average compensation, plus the sum of \$1,200 provided, however, that the minimum annual retirement allowance will be \$300 per year.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued) December 31, 2022

Contributions

Contribution requirements of active employees are governed by the Retirement Ordinance of the City's Charter of New Orleans. Employee and employer contributions are deducted from a member's salary and remitted to the Plan by participating employers. For the 2022 fiscal year, employees participating in the Retirement System are required to contribute 6% of their salary and the employer is required to contribute 15.31%. Employer contributions to the Retirement System are based upon the amount necessary to fund normal cost and amortization of past service costs over a period of thirty years.

The contribution requirements of Retirement System members of the City's established and may be amended by the Retirement System's board of trustees. MYHMC's contributions to the Retirement System, which were equal to the required contribution, for the year ended December 31, 2022 were \$48,742. However, MYHMC does not guarantee any of the benefits granted by the plan.

Pension Liabilities, Pension Expense, and Deferred Outflow of Resources and Deferred Inflow of Resources Related to Pensions

At December 31, 2022, the Employer reported a liability of \$409,885 for its proportionate share of the Net Pension Liability. The Net Pension Liability was measured as of December 31, 2021 and the total pension liability used to calculate the Net Pension Liability was determined by an actuarial valuation as of that date. MYHMC's proportion of the Net Pension Liability was based on a projection of MYHMC's long-term share of contributions to the pension plan relative to the projected contributions of all participating employers, actuarially determined. At December 31, 2022, MYHMC's proportion was .155380%, which was an increase of .012257% from its proportion measured as of December 31, 2021.

For the year ended December 31, 2022, MYHMC recognized pension expense of \$64,281 plus employer's amortization of change in proportionate share and differences between employer contributions and proportionate share of contributions of \$8,413.

The long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was determined using a building-block method in which best estimate ranges of expected future rates of return (expected returns, net of pension plan investment expense and inflation) are developed for each major asset class. These ranges are combined to produce the long-term expected rate of return by weighting the expected future real rated of return by the target asset allocation percentage and by adding expected inflation and an adjustment for the effect of rebalancing/diversification.

Discount Rate

The discount rate used to measure the total pension liability was 7.25%. The projection of cash flows used to determine the discount rate assumed that employee contributions will be made at the current contribution rate and that employer contributions from participating employers will be made at contractually required rates, actuarially determined. Based on those assumptions, the pension plan's fiduciary net position was projected to be available to make all projected future benefit payments of current active and inactive plan members. Therefore, the long-term expected rate of return on pension plan investments was applied to all periods of projected benefit payments to determine the total pension liability.

Sensitivity of the Employer's Proportionate Share of the Net Pension Liability to Changes in the Discount Rate

Note 7 – Prior Period Adjustment

The net effect to the Statement of Position for the prior year that resulted from the adoption of GASB 68, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Pensions, was a decrease restatement of net position at December 31, 2021 of \$346,708.

Note 8 – Other Post-Employment Benefits

Other post-employment benefits are incurred and paid by the City of New Orleans; therefore, MYHMC does not accrue a liability related to those benefits.

Note 9 – Leases Receivable

Boat slips, boathouse property and commercial property located at West End are leased to outside parties. The terms of the various lease agreements range from one to 77 years. MYHMC recognized \$590,115 in aggregate lease revenue interest revenue during the 2022 fiscal year. As of December 31, 2022, MYHMC's aggregate lease receivable balance for lease payments is \$12,295,249. MYHMC has a deferred inflows of resources associated with these leases that will be recognized as revenue over the lease term. As of December 31, 2022, the balance of the deferred inflows of resources is \$12,268,651.

Note 10 – Related Party Payables

MYHMC owes the City of New Orleans \$20,177 as of December 31, 2022 for payroll liabilities, including accrued leave. The balance is included in accrued payroll liabilities on the statement of net position. MYHJMC also reimburses the City of New Orleans for their portion of the defined benefit pension plan, which totaled \$48,742 for the year ended December 31, 2022.

For those entities reporting on the governmental accounting model, observe whether the minutes reference or included monthly budget-to-actual comparisons on the general fund, quarterly budget-to-actual, at a minimum, on proprietary funds, and semi-annual budget-to-actual, at a minimum, on all special revenue funds. Alternately, for those entities reporting on the nonprofit accounting model, observe that the minutes or included financial activity relating to public funds if those public funds comprised more than 10% of the entity's collections during the fiscal period.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

c. For governmental entities, obtain the prior year audit report and observe the unassigned fund balance in the general fund. If the general fund had a negative ending unassigned fund balance in the prior year audit report, observe that the minutes for at least one meeting during the fiscal period referenced or included a formal plan to eliminate the negative unassigned fund balance in the general fund.

We performed the above procedures and noted no exceptions.

Bank Reconciliations

- 3) Obtain a listing of entity bank accounts for the fiscal period from management and management's representation that the listing is complete. Ask management to identify the entity's main operating account. Select the entity's main operating account and randomly select 4 additional accounts (or all accounts if less than 5). Randomly select one month from the fiscal period, obtain and inspect the corresponding bank statement and reconciliation for each selected account, and observe that:
 - **a.** Bank reconciliations include evidence that they were prepared within 2 months of the related statement closing date (e.g., initialed and dated or electronically logged);

We performed the procedures above and no exceptions noted.

b. Bank reconciliations include evidence that a member of management/board member who does not handle cast, post ledgers, or issue checks has reviewed each bank reconciliation (e.g., initialed and dated, electronically logged): and

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

c. Management has documentation reflecting it has researched reconciling items that have been outstanding for more than 12 months from the statement closing date, if applicable.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

Collections

- 4) Obtain a listing of deposit sites for the fiscal period where deposits for cash/checks/money orders (cash) are prepared and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 deposit sites (or all deposit sites if less than 5).
- 5) For each deposit site selected, obtain a listing of collection locations and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select one collection location for each deposit

site (i.e., 5 collection locations for 5 deposit sites), obtain and inspect written policies and procedures relating to employee job duties (if no written policies or procedures, inquire of employees about their job duties) at each collection location, and observe that job duties are segregated at each collection location such that:

a. Employees that are responsible for cash collections do not share cash drawers/registers.

We performed the above procedures and noted no exceptions.

b. Each employee responsible for collecting cash is not responsible for preparing/making bank deposits, unless another employee/official is responsible for reconciling collection documentation (e.g. pre-numbered receipts) to the deposit.

We performed the above procedures and noted no exceptions.

c. Each employee responsible for collecting cash is not responsible for posting collection entries to general ledger or subsidiary ledgers, unless another employee/official is responsible for reconciling ledger postings to each other and to the deposits.

We performed the above procedures and noted no exceptions.

d. The employee(s) responsible for reconciling cash collections to the general ledger and/or subsidiary ledgers, by revenue source and/or agency fund additions are not responsible for collecting cash, unless another employee/official verifies the reconciliation.

We performed the above procedures and noted no exceptions.

6) Obtain from management a copy of the bond or insurance policy for theft covering all employees who have access to cash. Observe the bond or insurance policy for theft was enforced during the fiscal period.

We performed the above procedures and noted no exceptions.

- 7) Randomly select two deposit dates for each of the 5 bank accounts selected for procedure #3 under "Bank Reconciliations" above (select the next deposit date chronologically if no deposits were made on the dates randomly selected and randomly select a deposit if multiple deposits are made on the same day). Alternatively, the practitioner may use a source document other than bank statements when selecting the deposit dates for testing, such as a cash collection log, daily revenue report, receipt book, etc. Obtain supporting documentation for each of the 10 deposits and:
- 8) Observe that receipts are sequentially pre-numbered.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

a. Trace sequentially pre-numbered receipts, system reports, and other related collection documentation to the deposit slip.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

b. Trace the deposit slip total to the actual deposit per the bank statement.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

c. Observe the deposit was made within one business day of receipt at the collection location (within one week if the depository is more than 10 miles from the collection location or the deposit is less than \$100 and the cash is stored securely in a locked safe or drawer).

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

d. Trace the actual deposit per the bank statement to the general ledger.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

Non-Payroll Disbursements (excluding card purchases/payments, travel reimbursements, and petty cash purchases)

- 9) Obtain a listing of locations that process payments for the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 locations (or all locations if less than
- 10) For each location selected under #8 above, obtain a listing of those employees involved with nonpayroll purchasing and payment functions. Obtain written policies and procedures relating to employee job duties (if the agency has no written policies and procedures, inquire of employees about their job duties), and observe that job duties are properly segregated such that:
 - **a.** At least two employees are involved in initiating a purchase request, approving a purchase, and placing an order/making the purchase.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

b. At least two employees are involved in processing and approving payments to vendors.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

c. The employee responsible for processing payments is prohibited from adding/ modifying vendor files, unless another employee is responsible for periodically reviewing changes to vendor files.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

d. Either the employee/official responsible for signing checks mails the payment or gives the signed checks to an employee to mail who is not responsible for processing payments.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

- 11) For each location selected under #8 above, obtain the entity's non-payroll disbursement transaction population (excluding cards and travel reimbursements) and obtain management's representation that the population is complete. Randomly select 5 disbursements for each location, obtain supporting documentation for each transaction and:
 - **a.** Observe whether the disbursement matched the related original itemized invoice and supporting documentation indicates deliverables included on the invoice were received by the entity.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

b. Observe whether the disbursement documentation included evidence (e.g., initial/ date, electronic logging) of segregation of duties tested under #9, as applicable.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

Credit Cards/Debit Cards/Fuel Cards/P-Cards

12) Obtain from management a listing of all active credit cards, bank debit cards, fuel cards, and Pcards (card) for the fiscal period, including the card numbers and the names of the persons who maintained possession of the cards. Obtain management's representation that the listing is complete.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

- 13) Using the listing prepared by management randomly select 5 cards (or all cards if less than 5 that were used during the fiscal period. Randomly select one monthly statement or combined statement for each card (for a debit card, randomly select one monthly bank statement), obtain supporting documentation, and:
 - **a.** Observe that there is evidence that the monthly statement or combined statement and supporting documentation (e.g. original receipts for credit/debit card purchases exception reports for excessive fuel card usage) was reviewed and approved, in writing by someone other than the authorized card holder. (Note: Requiring such approval may constrain the legal authority of certain public officials (e.g., mayor of a Lawrason Act municipality); these instances should not be reported.]

We performed the procedure above and no exceptions noted.

b. Observe that finance charges and late fees were not assessed on the selected statements.

We performed the procedures above and no exceptions noted.

14) Using the monthly statements or combined statements selected under #12 above, excluding fuel cards, randomly select 10 transactions (or all transactions if less than 10) from each statement, and obtain supporting documentation for the transactions (i.e., each card should have 10 transactions subject to testing). For each transaction, observe it is supported by (1) an original itemized receipt that identifies precisely what was purchased, (2) written documentation of the business/public purpose, and (3) documentation of the individuals participating in meals (for meal charges only). For missing receipts, the practitioner should describe the nature of the transaction and note whether management had a compensating control to address missing receipts, such as a "missing receipt statement" that is subject to increased scrutiny.

We performed the procedure above and no exceptions noted.

Travel and Travel-Related Expense Reimbursements (excluding card transactions)

- 15) Obtain from management a listing of all travel and travel-related expense reimbursements during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing or general ledger is complete. Randomly select 5 reimbursements, obtain the related expense reimbursement forms/prepaid expense documentation of each selected reimbursement, as well as the supporting documentation. For each of the 5 reimbursements selected:
 - **a.** If reimbursed using a per diem, observe the approved reimbursement rate is no more than those rates established either by the State of Louisiana or the U.S. General Services Administration.

We performed the above procedures and noted no exceptions.

b. If reimbursed using actual costs, observe the reimbursement is supported by an original itemized receipt that identified precisely what was purchased.

We performed the above procedures and noted no exceptions.

c. Observe each reimbursement is supported by documentation of the business/public purpose (for meal charges, observe that the documentation includes the name of those individuals participating and other documentation required by written policy (procedure #1h).

We performed the above procedures and noted no exceptions.

d. Observe each reimbursement was reviewed and approved, in writing, by someone other than the person receiving reimbursement.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

Contracts

- 16) Obtain from management a listing of all agreements/contracts for professional services, materials and supplies, leases, and construction activities that were initiated or renewed during the fiscal period. Alternately, the practitioner may use an equivalent selection source, such as an active vendor list. Obtain management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 contracts (or all contracts if less than 5) from the listing, excluding the practitioner's contract, and:
 - **a.** Observe that the contract was bid in accordance with the Louisiana Public Bid Law (e.g., solicited quotes or bids, advertised), if required by law.

We performed the procedures above and no exceptions noted.

b. Observe that the contract was approved by the governing body/board, if required by policy or law (e.g. Lawrason Act, Home Rule Charter).

We performed the procedures above and no exceptions noted.

c. If the contract was amended (e.g. change order), observe that the original contract terms provided for such an amendment and that amendments were made in compliance with the contract terms (e.g., if approval is required for any amendment, was approval documented).

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

Payroll and Personnel

- 17) Obtain a listing of employees/elected officials employed during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 employees/officials, obtain related paid salaries and personnel files, and agree paid salaries to authorized salaries/pay rates in the personnel files.
- 18) Randomly select one pay period during the fiscal period. For the 5 employees/officials selected under #16 above, obtain attendance records and leave documentation for the pay period, and:
 - **a.** Observe that all selected employees/officials documented their daily attendance and leave (e.g., vacation, sick, compensatory). (Note: Generally, an elected official is not eligible to earn leave and does not document his/her attendance and leave. However, if the elected official is earning leave according to policy and/or contract, the official should document his/her daily attendance and leave.)

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

b. Observe that any leave accrued or taken during the pay period is reflected in the entity's cumulative leave records.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

19) Obtain a listing of those employees or officials that received termination payments during the fiscal period and management's representation that the list is complete. Randomly select two employees or officials, obtain related documentation of the hours and pay rates used in management's termination payment calculations and the entity's policy on termination payments. Agree the hours

to the employee or officials' cumulative leave records, agree the pay rates to the employee or officials authorized pay rates in the employee or officials' personnel files, and agree the termination payment to entity policy.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

20) Obtain management's representation that employer and employee portions of third-party payroll related amounts (e.g., payroll taxes, retirement contributions, health insurance premiums, garnishments, workers' compensation premiums, etc.) have been paid, and any associated forms have been filed, by required deadlines.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

Ethics

- 21) Using the 5 randomly selected employees/officials from procedure #16 under "Payroll and Personnel" above obtain ethics documentation from management, and:
 - **a.** Observe that the documentation demonstrates each employee/official completed one hour of ethics training during the fiscal period.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

b. Observe whether the entity maintains documentation which demonstrates each employee and official were notified of any changes to the entity's ethics policy during the fiscal period, as applicable.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

Debt Service

22) Obtain a listing of bonds/notes issued during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Select all bonds/notes on the listing, obtain supporting documentation, and observe that State Bond Commission approval was obtained for each bond/note issued.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

23) Obtain a listing of bonds/notes outstanding at the end of the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select one bond/note, inspect debt covenants, obtain supporting documentation for the reserve balance and payments, and agree actual reserve balances and payments to those required by debt covenants (including contingency funds, short-lived asset funds, or other funds required by the debt covenants).

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

Fraud Notice

24) Obtain a listing of misappropriations of public funds and assets during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Select all misappropriations on the listing, obtain supporting documentation, and observe that the entity reported the misappropriation(s) to the legislative auditor and the district attorney of the parish in which the entity is domiciled.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions noted.

25) Observe that the entity has posted on its premises and website, the notice required by R.S. 24:523.1 concerning the reporting of misappropriation, fraud, waste, or abuse of public funds.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions noted.

- 26) Perform the following procedures, verbally discuss the results with management, and report "We performed the procedure and discussed the results with management."
 - **a.** Obtain and inspect the entity's most recent documentation that it has backed up its critical data (if no written documentation, inquire of personnel responsible for backing up critical data) and observe that such backup occurred within the past week. If backups are stored on a physical medium (e.g., tapes, CDs), observe evidence that backups are encrypted before being transported.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions noted.

b. Obtain and inspect the entity's most recent documentation that it has tested/verified that its backups can be restored (if no written documentation, inquire of personnel responsible for testing/verifying backup restoration) and observe evidence that the test/verification was successfully performed within the past 3 months.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

c. Obtain a listing of the entity's computers currently in use and their related locations, and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 computers and observe while management demonstrates that the selected computers have current and active antivirus software and that the operating system and accounting system software in use are currently supported by the vendor.

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

Sexual Harassment

27) Using the 5 randomly selected employees/officials from procedure #16 under "Payroll and Personnel" above, obtain sexual harassment training documentation from management, and observe the documentation demonstrates each employee/official completed at least one hour of sexual harassment training during the calendar year.

We performed the procedure above and noted no exceptions.

28) Observe the entity has posted its sexual harassment policy and complaint procedure on its website (or in a conspicuous location on the entity's premises if the entity does not have a website).

We performed the procedures above and noted no exceptions.

29) Obtain the entity's annual sexual harassment report for the current fiscal period, observe that the report was dated on or before February 1, and observe it includes the applicable requirements of R.S. 42:344:

We performed the procedures and noted no exceptions.

a. Number and percentage of public servants in the agency who have completed the training requirements;

b. Number of sexual harassment complaints received by the agency;
