INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Commissioners,
Lafourche Parish Juvenile Justice Commission,
Thibodaux, Louisiana.

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities and General Fund of Lafourche Parish Juvenile Justice Commission (the "Commission"), a component unit of the Lafourche Parish Council, State of Louisiana, as of and for the year ended June 30, 2022, and the related notes to the financial statements, which collectively comprise the Commission's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities and the General Fund of the Commission as of June 30, 2022 and the respective changes in net position and budgetary comparison of the General Fund for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Commission and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements related to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Commission's ability to continue as a going concern for the twelve months beyond the financial statement date, including any currently known information that may raise substantial doubt shortly thereafter.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards*, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Commission's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Commission's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control related matters that we identified during the audit.

Required Supplementary Information

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that management's discussion and analysis on pages 4 through 9 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board who considers it to be an economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consisted of inquires of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures do not provide us with sufficient evidence to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements that collectively comprise the Commission's basic financial statements. The accompanying supplementary information on page 37 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements. This information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the basic financial statements or to the basic financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the basic financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by *Government Auditing Standards*

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 27, 2022 on our consideration of the Commission's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the Commission's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the Commission's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

MANAGEMENT'S DISCUSSION AND ANALYSIS

Lafourche Parish Juvenile Justice Commission Thibodaux, Louisiana

June 30, 2022

The Management's Discussion and Analysis of the Lafourche Parish Juvenile Justice Commission's (the "Commission") financial performance presents a narrative overview and analysis of the Commission's financial activities for the year ended June 30, 2022. This document focuses on the current year's activities, resulting changes, and currently known facts. Please read this document in conjunction with the financial statements, which follow this section.

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

The Commission's assets exceeded its liabilities as of June 30, 2022 by \$1,741,673 (net position), which represents a 5.09% decrease from June 30, 2021.

The Commission's revenue increased \$232,735 (or 6.43%) primarily due to an increase in charges for services and grants and contributions not restricted to specific program.

The Commission's expenses decreased \$295,476 (or 6.97%) primarily due to decreases in expenses related to personal services.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

This discussion and analysis is intended to serve as an introduction to the Commission's financial statements. The Commission's financial statements consist of three parts: (1) management's discussion and analysis (this section) (2) basic financial statements and (3) various governmental compliance reports and schedules by certified public accountants and management.

The financial statements include two kinds of statements that present different views of the Commission:

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued)

Government-wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the Commission's finances, in a manner similar to a private sector business. The Statement of Net Position presents information on all of the Commission's assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, and deferred inflows of resources with the difference reported as net position. Over time, increases or decreases in net position may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the Commission is improving or deteriorating. The Statement of Activities presents information showing how the Commission's net position changed during each fiscal year. All changes in net position are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future fiscal periods.

The governmental activity of the Commission is public safety which is comprised of various programs that include Group Home Units which serve as a long-term treatment program for abused and neglected youths and a Detention Unit which provides secure custody ordered by the courts for troubled youth.

Fund Financial Statements

A fund is a grouping of related accounts that is used to maintain control over resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The Commission maintains one type of fund, governmental.

Governmental Funds

Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions reported as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on near-term inflows and outflows of spendable resources, as well as on balances of spendable resources available at the end of the fiscal year. Because the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. Both the Governmental Fund Balance Sheet and the Governmental Fund Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (Continued)**Governmental Funds (Continued)**

The Commission maintains one governmental fund. Information is presented in the Governmental Fund Balance Sheet and in the Governmental Fund Statement of Revenues, Expenditures, and Changes in Fund Balance for the General Fund. The Commission adopts an annual appropriated budget for its General Fund. A budgetary comparison statement has been provided for the General Fund to demonstrate compliance with this budget. The governmental fund financial statements can be found on pages 10 through 18 of this report.

Notes to the Financial Statements

The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements. The notes to the financial statements can be found in Exhibit H of this report.

GOVERNMENT-WIDE FINANCIAL ANALYSIS

As noted earlier, net position may serve over time as a useful indicator of the Commission's financial position. As of June 30, 2022, assets exceeded liabilities and deferred inflows of resources by \$1,741,673. A large portion of the Commission's net position (66.40%) reflects its investment in capital assets (buildings, furniture, fixtures, and equipment). Consequently, these assets are not available for future spending.

Current and other assets and long-term liabilities increased due to the Commission's issuance of \$1,575,000 of Revenue Anticipation Note, Series 2022 during the year to offset cash flows issues due to delay in receipt of ad valorem tax revenue after Hurricane Ida.

Governmental Activities

Governmental activities decreased the Commission's net position by \$93,471. Key elements of this decrease are as follows:

The increase in total revenue was primarily due to an increase in boys' and girls' group home per diem amounts received from the State of Louisiana. This was the result of the facility being licensed as a Level 3 Non-Medical Group home on November 1, 2021, which increased the per diem rate to \$330 per day per resident. The Commission also received two grants during the fiscal year totaling \$70,000 for relief after Hurricane Ida. The decrease in total expenses is primarily due to decreases in personal services due to employee terminations and resignations during the year. The Commission also recognized a \$53,201 loss as a result of Hurricane Ida damages to the facilities.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE GOVERNMENT'S FUNDS

As noted earlier, the Commission uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal requirements.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE GOVERNMENT'S FUNDS (Continued)**Governmental Funds**

The focus of the Commission's governmental fund is to provide information on near-term inflows, outflows, and balances of spendable resources. Such information is useful in assessing the Commission's financing requirements. In particular, fund balance may serve as a useful measure of a government's net resources available for spending at the end of the fiscal year. As of June 30, 2022, the Commission's governmental fund reported ending fund balance of \$2,348,145, an increase of \$1,614,007 in comparison to the prior year.

General Fund Budgetary Highlights

The budget was amended once during the year. The primary reason for amending the budget was to reflect estimated revenues and expenses more accurately. The major differences between the original General Fund budget and the final amended budget were as follows:

Revenues

- Decreased tax revenues to reflect anticipated receipts.
- Increased State of Louisiana revenues to reflect actual receipts.
- Decreased interest to reflect actual interest earned.

Expenditures

- Decreased personal services to better reflect personal services expense.
- Decreased operating services to reflect actual expense.
- Decreased supplies and materials to better reflect actual supplies and materials expense.

During the year, actual revenues and expenditures exceeded the budgetary estimates.

Long-Term Debt

During the year ended June 30, 2022, the Commission issued \$1,575,000 in Revenue Anticipation Note, Series 2022. Additional information on the Commission's note can be found in Exhibit H, Note 7 of this report.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGET AND RATES

The Board of Commissioners considered the following factors and indicators when setting next year's budget, rates, and fees. These factors and indicators include:

- Consideration of funding to be received from contracts and grants.
- The property tax revenue budgeted, materially consistent in accordance with the Commission's accounting policy, represents the estimated amount for the November 2022 assessment, which the Commission will receive, for the most part, in January 2023.
- Salaries and benefits are based on the number of employees needed to perform necessary services and the related benefits.
- Estimate of operating supplies needed to perform necessary services.
- Services the Commission will provide along with estimated service cost.
- Detailed plan of equipment needed to be purchased.

The Commission receives most of its funding from local taxes and departments of the State of Louisiana. Some of the Commission's grants and contracts are contingent upon the level of service provided by the Commission; therefore, revenues from grants may vary from year to year.

Note 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Lafourche Parish Juvenile Justice Commission (the "Commission") was created in 1978 under the provisions of Article VI, Sections 5 and 15 of the Constitution of the State of Louisiana of 1974, and Article III of the Home Rule Charter of the Parish of Lafourche to acquire and administer a juvenile justice facility or facilities.

The powers of the Commission, control and management of the affairs of the Commission, are vested in a board of commissioners composed of six qualified electors residing in Lafourche Parish. The commissioners are appointed from the North, South and Central regions of the Parish by the Lafourche Parish Council from names submitted by the Seventeenth Judicial District Judges, the Lafourche Parish School Board and by members of the Lafourche Parish Council.

The accounting policies of the Commission conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The following is a summary of significant accounting policies:

a) Reporting Entity

The Commission is a component unit of the Lafourche Parish Council.

GASB No. 14, "*The Financial Reporting Entity*", GASB No. 39, "*Determining Whether Certain Organizations Are Component Units-an amendment of GASB Statement No. 14*", and GASB No. 61, "*The Financial Reporting Entity: Omnibus and amendment of GASB Statements No. 14 and No. 34*" established the criterion for determining which component units should be considered part of the Commission for financial reporting purposes. The basic criteria are as follows:

1. Legal status of the potential component unit including the right to incur its own debt, levy its own taxes and charges, expropriate property in its own name, sue and be sued, and the right to buy, sell and lease property in its own name.

Note 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

a) Reporting Entity (Continued)

2. Whether the governing authority appoints a majority of the board members of the potential component unit.
3. Fiscal interdependency between the Commission and the potential component unit.
4. Imposition of will by the Commission on the potential component unit.
5. Financial benefit/burden relationship between the Commission and the potential component unit.

The Commission has reviewed all of its activities and determined there are no potential component units which should be included in its financial statements.

b) Basis of Presentation

The Commission's financial statements consist of the government-wide statements on all activities of the Commission and the governmental fund financial statements.

Government-wide Financial Statements:

The government-wide financial statements include the Statement of Net Position and the Statement of Activities for all activities of the Commission. The government-wide presentation focuses primarily on the sustainability of the Commission as an entity and the change in aggregate financial position resulting from the activities of the fiscal period. Governmental activities generally are financed through taxes, intergovernmental revenues, and other non-exchange revenues.

Fund Financial Statements:

The daily accounts and operations of the Commission are organized on the basis of funds and account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of the fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, deferred outflows of resources, liabilities, deferred inflow of resources, equity, revenues, and expenditures. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in the fund based upon the purpose for which they are to be spent and the means by which spending activities are controlled. The following is the governmental fund of the Commission:

Note 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

b) Basis of Presentation (Continued)

General Fund - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the Commission. It is used to account for all financial resources except those that are required to be accounted for in another fund.

c) Measurement Focus and Basis of Accounting

Measurement focus is a term used to describe "which" transactions are recorded within the various financial statements. Basis of accounting refers to "when" transactions are recorded regardless of the measurement focus applied.

Government-wide Financial Statements:

The government-wide financial statements are reported using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability is incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized in the year for which they are levied.

Fund Financial Statements:

All governmental funds are accounted for using a current financial resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, only current assets and current liabilities generally are included on the balance sheet. Operating statements of these funds present increases (revenues and other financing sources) and decreases (expenditures and other uses) in net current assets. Governmental funds are maintained on the modified accrual basis of accounting.

Governmental fund revenues resulting from exchange transactions are recognized in the fiscal year in which the exchange takes place and meets the government's availability criteria (susceptible to accrual). Available means that the resources will be collected within the current year or are expected to be collected soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current year. For this purpose, the Commission considers revenues to be available if they are collected within 60 days of the end of the current fiscal year. Ad valorem taxes and the related state revenue sharing (intergovernmental revenue) are recognized as revenue in the period for which levied, thus the 2021 property taxes which are being levied to finance expenditures for the 2022 calendar year will be recognized as revenue in the fiscal years ending June 30, 2022 and 2023. Accordingly, one half of the 2021 tax levy is recorded as deferred inflows of resources as of June 30, 2022. Intergovernmental revenues consist

of per diem funding received on a per client/unit basis. These funds, along with charges for services, are recorded when earned since they are measurable and available. Miscellaneous revenues are recorded as revenues when received in cash by the Commission or an intermediary collecting agency because they are generally not measurable or available until actually received.

Expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related fund liability is incurred. An exception to this general rule is vacation and sick leave which are recognized when paid. Allocations of cost such as depreciation are not recognized in the governmental funds.

d) Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

e) Operating Budgetary Data

As required by the Louisiana Revised Statute 39:1303, the Board of Commissioners adopted a budget for the Commission's General Fund. The budgetary practices include public notice of the proposed budget, public inspection of the proposed budget and public hearings on the budget prior to adoption. Any amendment involving the transfer of monies from one function to another or increases in expenditures at the functional level must be approved by the Commission. The Commission amended its budget once during the year ended June 30, 2022. All budgeted amounts which are not expended, or obligated through contracts, lapse at year-end.

The General Fund budget is adopted on a basis materially consistent with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

The General Fund budget is included in the financial statements.

Note 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

f) Accounts Receivable

The financial statements of the Commission contain no allowance for uncollectible accounts. Uncollectible amounts due for ad valorem taxes and other receivables are recognized as bad debts at the time information becomes available which would indicate the uncollectibility of the particular receivable. These amounts are not considered to be material in relation to the financial position or operations of the funds.

g) Capital Assets

The accounting treatment over property, plant, and equipment (capital assets) depends on whether the assets are reported in the government-wide or fund financial statements.

Government-wide Financial Statements:

In the government-wide financial statements, fixed assets are accounted for as capital assets. Capital assets purchased or acquired with an original cost of \$500 or more and a useful life greater than one year are valued at historical cost or estimated historical cost if actual is unavailable, except for donated capital assets which are recorded at their estimated fair value at the date of donation. Additions, improvements, and other capital outlays that significantly extend the useful life of an asset are capitalized. Other costs incurred for repairs and maintenance are expensed as incurred.

Depreciation of all exhaustible capital assets is recorded as an expense in the Statement of Activities, with accumulated depreciation reflected in the Statement of Net Position. Depreciation is provided over the assets' estimated useful lives using the straight-line method of depreciation. The range of estimated useful lives by type of asset is as follows:

Buildings	15 - 40 years
Furniture, fixtures, and equipment	5 - 15 years

Fund Financial Statements:

In the fund financial statements, capital assets used in governmental fund operations are accounted for as capital outlay expenditures of the governmental fund upon acquisition.

Note 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

h) Long-Term Obligations

The accounting treatment of long-term obligations depends on whether they are reported in the government-wide or fund financial statements.

Government-wide Financial Statements:

All long-term obligations to be repaid from governmental resources are reported as liabilities in the government-wide statements. The long-term obligations consist of accrued compensated absences-vacation, compensatory time, and revenue anticipation note.

Fund Financial Statements:

Long-term obligations for governmental funds are not reported as liabilities in the fund financial statements.

i) Vacation and Sick Leave

The Commission's policies regarding vacation permit employees to accumulate earned but unused vacation. The liability for these compensated absences is recorded as a long-term obligation in the government-wide statements. In the fund financial statements, governmental funds report only the compensated absence liability.

Eligible personnel will earn credits for annual vacation and sick leave for each month of employment. The number of credits earned is based upon length of service. At the end of each calendar year accumulated vacation and sick leave is carried forward to the new year. At no time can an employee's accumulated vacation balance exceed 15 days more than the rate of accrual. All accumulated vacation vests to the employees; however, all accumulated sick leave lapses at separation of employment.

Compensatory time will be given to those employees not subject to overtime pay. Rate of accrual will be hour for hour with the limitation of ten workdays per calendar year. Compensatory time accrued should be taken within the calendar year in which it is accrued. The Commission will pay up to five days of the unused compensatory time at the close of the year.

Note 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

j) Deferred Inflows of Resources

The Commission reports deferred inflows of resources when resources associated with imposed non exchange revenue transactions are received or reported as a receivable before (a) the period for which property taxes are levied or (b) the period when resources are required to be used or when use is first permitted for all other imposed non exchange revenues in which the enabling legislation includes time requirements.

k) Fund Equity

Government-wide Financial Statements:

Equity is classified as net position and displayed in three components:

- a. Net investment in capital assets - Consists of capital assets net of accumulated depreciation and reduced by the outstanding balances of any bonds, mortgages, notes, or other borrowings that are attributable to the acquisition, construction, or improvement of those assets, if any. As of June 30, 2022, the Commission had no outstanding borrowings that are attributable to capital assets.
- b. Restricted net position - Consists of assets less liabilities and deferred inflow of resources (net position) with constraints placed on the use either by (1) external groups such as creditors, grantors, contributions or laws or regulations of other governments; or (2) law through constitutional provisions or enabling legislation.
- c. Unrestricted net position - All other net position that do not meet the definition of "restricted" or "net investment in capital assets."

When both restricted and unrestricted resources are available for use, it is the Commission's policy to use restricted resources first, then unrestricted resources as they are needed. As of June 30, 2022, the Commission had \$1,595,930 of restricted resources.

Fund Financial Statements:

Governmental fund equity is classified as fund balance. Fund balance is further classified as follows:

- a. Non-spendable - amounts that cannot be spent either because they are in non-spendable form or because they are legally or contractually required to maintain intact.

Note 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

k) Fund Equity (Continued)

- b. Restricted - amounts that can be spent only for specific purposes because of constitutional provisions, charter requirements or enabling legislation or because of constraints that are externally imposed by creditors, grantors, contributors, or the laws or regulations of other governments.
- c. Committed - amounts that can be used only for specific purposes determined by a formal action of the Commission's Board. Commitments may be established, modified, or rescinded only through resolutions approved by the Board of Commissioners.
- d. Assigned - amounts that do not meet the criteria to be classified as either restricted or committed but that are intended to be used for specific purposes. Assignments may be established, modified, or rescinded only through a majority vote of the Board of Commissioners.
- e. Unassigned - all other spendable amounts. This classification is the residual fund balance for the General Fund. It represents fund balance that has not been restricted, committed, or assigned to specific purposes within the General Fund.

For the classification of governmental fund balances, the Commission considers expenditures to be made from the most restrictive first when more than one classification is available. The Commission's fund balance was classified as restricted, assigned, and unassigned as of June 30, 2022. Restricted fund balance as of June 30, 2022 is for repayment of the revenue anticipation note in fiscal year 2022-2023. Assigned fund balance as of June 30, 2022 is for 2022-2023 budgetary expenditures in excess of budgetary revenues.

l) New GASB Statements

During the year ended June 30, 2022, the Commission implemented the following GASB Statements:

Statement No. 87, "*Leases*" increases the usefulness of governments' financial statements by requiring recognition of certain lease assets and liabilities for leases that previously were classified as operating leases and recognized as inflows of resources or outflows of resources based on the payment provisions of the contract. It establishes a single model for lease accounting based on the foundational principle that leases are financings of the right to use an underlying asset. Under this statement, a lessee is required to recognize a lease liability and an intangible right-to-use lease asset, and a

lessor is required to recognize a lease receivable and a deferred inflow of resources, thereby enhancing the relevance and consistency of information about governments' leasing activities. This Statement did not affect the Commission's financial statements.

Statement No. 91, "*Conduit Debt Obligations*" provides a single method of reporting conduit debt obligations by issuers and eliminate diversity in practice associated with (1) commitments extended by issuers, (2) arrangements associated with conduit debt obligations, and (3) related note disclosures. This Statement achieves those objectives by clarifying the existing definition of a conduit debt obligation; establishing that a conduit debt obligation is not a liability of the issuer; establishing standards for accounting and financial reporting of additional commitments and voluntary commitments extended by issuers and arrangements associated with conduit debt obligations; and improving required note disclosures. This Statement did not affect the Commission's financial statements.

Statement No. 92, "*Omnibus 2020*" establishes accounting and financial reporting requirements for specific issues related to leases, intra-entity transfers of assets, postemployment benefits, government acquisitions, risk financing and insurance related activities of public entity risk pools, fair value measurements, and derivative instruments. This Statement did not affect the Commission's financial statements.

Statement No. 93, "*Replacement of Interbank Offered Rates*" some governments have entered into agreements in which variable payments made or received depend on an interbank offered rate (IBOR) most notably, the London Interbank Offered Rate (LIBOR). As a result of global reference rate reform, LIBOR is expected to cease to exist in its current form at the end of 2021, prompting governments to amend or replace financial instruments for the purpose of replacing LIBOR with other reference rates. This Statement will preserve the consistency and comparability of reporting hedging derivative instruments and leases after governments amend or replace agreements to replace an IBOR. This Statement did not affect the Commission's financial statements.

I) New GASB Statements (Continued)

Statement No. 97, "*Certain Component Unit Criteria, and Accounting and Financial Reporting for Internal Revenue Code Section 457 Deferred Compensation Plans - an Amendment of GASB Statements No. 14 and No. 84, and a Supersession of GASB Statement No. 32*" provides objectives to (1) increase consistency and comparability related to the reporting of fiduciary component units in circumstances in which a potential component unit does not have a governing board and the primary government performs the duties that a governing board typically would perform; (2) mitigate costs associated with the reporting of certain defined contribution pension plans, defined contribution other postemployment benefit (OPEB) plans, and employee benefit plans other than pension plans or OPEB plans (other employee benefit plans) as fiduciary component units in fiduciary fund financial statements; and (3) enhance the relevance, consistency, and comparability of the accounting and financial reporting for Internal Revenue Code (IRC) Section 457 deferred compensation plans (Section 457 plans) that meet the definition of a pension plan and for benefits provided through those plans. This Statement did not affect the Commission's financial statements.

Statement No. 98, "*The Annual Comprehensive Financial Report*" establishes the term annual comprehensive financial report and its acronym ACFR. The new term and acronym replace instance of comprehensive annual financial report and its acronym in generally accepted accounting principles for state and local governments. This Statement was developed in response to concerns raised by stakeholders that the common pronunciation of the acronym sounds like a profoundly objectionable racial slur. This Statement did not affect the Commission's financial statements.

The GASB has issued the following Statements which will become effective in future years as shown below:

Statement No. 94, "*Public-Private and Public-Public Partnerships and Availability Payment Arrangements*" improves financial reporting by addressing issues related to public-private and public-public partnership arrangements (PPPs). As used in this Statement, a PPP is an arrangement in which a government (the transferor) contracts with an operator (a governmental or nongovernmental entity) to provide public services by conveying control of the right to operate or use a nonfinancial asset, such as infrastructure or other capital asset (the underlying PPP asset), for a period of time in an exchange or exchange-like transaction. Some PPPs meet the definition of a service concession arrangement (SCA), which the Board defines in this Statement as a PPP in which (1) the operator collects and is compensated by fees from third parties;

(2) the transferor determines or has the ability to modify or approve which services the operator is required to provide, to whom the operator is required to provide the services, and the prices or rates that can be charged for the services; and (3) the transferor is entitled to significant residual interest in the service utility of the underlying PPP asset at the end of the arrangement. This Statement also provides guidance for accounting and financial reporting for availability payment arrangements (APAs). As defined in this Statement, an APA is an arrangement in which a government compensates an operator for services that may include designing, constructing, financing, maintaining, or operating an underlying nonfinancial asset for a period of time in an exchange or exchange-like transaction. The requirements of this Statement are effective for the years beginning after June 15, 2022. Management has yet to determine the effect of this Statement on the financial statements.

Statement No. 96, "*Subscription-based Information Technology Arrangements*" provides guidance on the accounting and financial reporting for subscription-based information technology arrangements (SBITAs) for government end users (governments). This Statement (1) defines a SBITA; (2) establishes that a SBITA results in a right-to-use subscription asset - an intangible asset - and a corresponding subscription liability; (3) provides the capitalization criteria for outlays other than subscription payments, including implementation costs of a SBITA; and (4) requires note disclosures regarding a SBITA. The requirements of this Statement are effective for the years beginning after June 15, 2022. Management has yet to determine the effect of this Statement on the financial statements.

Statement No. 99, "*Omnibus 2022*" provides objectives to enhance comparability in accounting and financial reporting and to improve the consistency of authoritative literature by addressing practice issues that have been identified during implementation and application of certain GASB Statements and accounting and financial report for financial guarantees. The requirements of this Statement apply to all financial statements at dates varying from upon issuance to fiscal periods beginning after June 15, 2023. Management has yet to determine the effect of this Statement on the financial statements.

Statement No. 100, "*Accounting Changes and Error Corrections - an amendment of GASB Statement No. 62*" provides guidance to enhance accounting and financial reporting requirements for accounting changes and error corrections to provide more understandable, reliable, relevant, consistent, and comparable information for making decisions or assessing accountability. The requirements of this Statement are effective for accounting changes and error corrections made in fiscal years beginning after June 15, 2023, and all reporting periods thereafter. Earlier application is encouraged. Management has yet to determine the effect of this Statement on the financial statements.

Statement No. 101, "*Compensated Absences*" provides guidance to better meet the information needs of financial statement users by updating the recognition and measurement guidance for compensated absences. That objective is achieved by aligning the recognition and measurement guidance under a unified model and by amending certain previously required disclosures. The requirements of this Statement are effective for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2023, and all reporting periods thereafter. Earlier application is encouraged. Management has yet to determine the effect of this Statement on the financial statements.

Note 2 - DEPOSITS

Louisiana state law allows all political subdivisions to invest excess funds in obligations of the United States or any other federally insured investment, certificates of deposit of any bank domiciled or having a branch office in the state of Louisiana, guaranteed investment contracts and investment grade (A-1/P-1) commercial paper of domestic corporations.

State law requires deposits (cash) of all political subdivisions to be fully collateralized at all times. Acceptable collateralization includes FDIC insurance and the market value of securities purchased and pledged to the political subdivision. Obligations of the United States, the State of Louisiana and certain political subdivisions are allowed as security for deposits. Obligations furnished as security must be held by the political subdivision or with an unaffiliated bank or trust company for the account of the political subdivision.

The year-end balances of deposits as of June 30, 2022 consisted of the following:

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, the Commission's deposits may not be returned to it. The Commission has a written policy for custodial credit risk. As of June 30, 2022, approximately \$2,509,631 of the Commission's bank balances of \$3,281,463 was exposed to custodial credit risk. These deposits were uninsured and collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent and are deemed to be held in the Commission's name as allowed by State Statutes.

As of June 30, 2022, cash in excess of the FDIC insurance was adequately collateralized by securities held by unaffiliated banks for the account of the Commission. The GASB, which promulgates the standards for accounting and financial reporting for state and local governments, considers these securities subject to custodial credit risk. Even though the deposits are considered subject to custodial credit risk under the provisions of GASB Statement No. 40, Louisiana Revised Statute 39:1229 imposes a statutory requirement on the custodial bank to advertise and sell the pledged securities within ten days of being notified by the depositor that the fiscal agent has failed to pay deposited funds upon demand.

Note 3 - PROPERTY TAXES

Property taxes are levied each November 1 on the assessed value listed as of the prior January 1 for all real property, merchandise and movable property located in the Parish of Lafourche. Assessed values are established by the Lafourche Parish Assessor's Office and the State Tax Commission at percentages of actual value as specified by Louisiana law. A reevaluation of all property is required to be completed no less than every four years. Due to extensive damage caused by Hurricane Ida, the Lafourche Parish Assessor's Office performed a reevaluation in March 2022. Taxes are due and payable December 31 with interest being charged on payments after January 1. Taxes can be paid through the tax sale date, which is the last Wednesday in June. Properties for which the taxes have not been paid are sold for the amount of the taxes. The tax rate for 2021 was \$3.20 per \$1,000 of assessed valuation on property within Lafourche Parish for the purpose of maintaining and operating the facilities. As indicated in Note 1c, taxes levied in calendar

year 2021 are used to fund expenditures in calendar year 2022, therefore one half of the 2021 tax levy was recognized as revenues in the fiscal year ended June 30, 2022 with the balance being recognized in the year ending June 30, 2023. The balance of the taxes levied which was not recognized is reported as deferred inflows of resources as of June 30, 2022.

Impairments and Insurance Proceeds

On August 29, 2021, Hurricane Ida severely impacted the Commission and the financial impact has yet to be determined. Numerous capital assets throughout the Commission were damaged and are still being repaired or replaced. In accordance with GASB Statement No. 42, "*Accounting and Financial Reporting for Impairment of Capital Assets and for Insurance Recoveries*", the Commission has reviewed its capital assets (a) to determine potential impairments from Hurricane Ida through inspection of physical damage and (b) to test for impairment to determine if the magnitude of the decline in service utility of the capital asset is significant and whether the decline in service utility is not part of the normal life cycle of the capital asset. For those properties that are impaired and will continue to be used by the Commission, a portion of historical cost of the asset and associated accumulated depreciation, will be written off using the Restoration Cost Approach which states that the amount of impairment is derived from the estimated costs to restore the utility of the capital asset.

Impaired capital assets that will no longer be used by the Commission will be reported at the lower of carrying value or fair value. The Commission has performed its inspection of physical damages to its facilities and found that the Ropes Building was completely damaged along with various other equipment and fixtures. Total damages did not exceed insurance deductible amounts; therefore, the Commission did not receive any insurance proceeds.

For the year ended June 30, 2022, the Commission recognized impairment losses on the items determined to be damaged from its inspection. The following table identifies damaged capital assets and the resulting impairment losses, which are reported in the Public Safety function.

On August 29, 2021, Hurricane Ida made landfall in Southeast Louisiana. As a result, there were significant damages across the region. In response to Hurricane Ida and delay in ad valorem tax receipts, the Commission issued a Revenue Anticipation Note, Series 2022 with a maturity date of September 30, 2022 to fund the Commission's anticipated working capital deficit during 2022. This note was issued on February 10, 2022. The principal amount of \$1,575,000 along with interest at 2.08% per annum is due September 30, 2022. The note is secured and payable from all revenues accruing to the Commission's General Fund.

Note 8 - RISK MANAGEMENT

The Commission is exposed to various risks of loss related to workers' compensation; torts; theft of, damage to and destruction of assets; errors and omissions; and natural disasters for which the Commission carries commercial insurance. No settlements were made during the year that exceeded the Commission's insurance coverage.

Note 9 - EMPLOYEE RETIREMENT PLAN

Employees are offered participation in the Louisiana Deferred Compensation Plan provided by the Commission to provide retirement benefits to the employee pursuant to Section 457 of the Internal Revenue Code. Participating employees may contribute an amount of their compensation not to exceed statutory limits. After six months of employment, the Commission will match dollar for dollar with holdings for full-time employee contributions as follows: not to exceed 6% of compensation for 1-10 years of continuous employment, not to exceed 8% of compensation for 11-15 years of continuous employment, not to exceed 10% of compensation for 16 or more years of continuous employment. During the year ended June 30, 2022, the Commission made contributions to the Louisiana Deferred Compensation Plan totaling \$90,177.

Note 10 - COMPENSATION OF BOARD MEMBERS

No compensation was paid to Board Members for the year ended June 30, 2022.

Note 11 - STATE OF LOUISIANA TAX ABATEMENTS

The Commission's ad valorem tax revenues for the year ended June 30, 2022 were reduced by \$134,266 under agreements entered into with the State of Louisiana.

Note 12 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Management evaluates events occurring subsequent to the date of the financial statements in determining the accounting for and disclosure of transactions and events that effect the financial statements. Subsequent events have been evaluated through September 27, 2022, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

Performance: Obtained monthly bank reconciliation for the month of June for the operating bank account and 4 additional accounts selected.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Bank Reconciliations: (Continued)

- b) Bank reconciliations include evidence that a member of management/board member who does not handle cash, post ledgers, or issue checks has reviewed each bank reconciliation (e.g., initialed and dated, electronically logged); and
Performance: Inspected the Commission's documentation for the June bank reconciliation for all bank accounts.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.
- c) Management has documentation reflecting that it has researched reconciling items that have been outstanding for more than 12 months from the statement closing date, if applicable.
Performance: Inspected documents for items outstanding for more than 12 months. There were no checks outstanding for longer than 12 months as of the end of the fiscal period.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Collections (Excluding Electronic Funds Transfers):

4. Obtain a listing of deposit sites for the fiscal period where deposits for cash/check/money orders (cash) are prepared and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 deposit sites (or all deposit sites if less than 5).
Performance: Obtained the listing of deposit sites from management and received management's representation in a separate letter that the listing is complete. The Commission has one deposit site.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.
5. For each deposit site selected, obtain a listing of collection locations and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select one collection location for each deposit site (i.e., collection locations for 5 deposit sites), obtain and inspect written policies and procedures relating to employee job duties (if no written policies or procedures, inquire of employees about their job duties) at each collection location, and observe that job duties are properly segregated at each collection location such that:
Performance: Obtained the listing of collection locations from management and received management's representation in a separate letter that the listing is complete. The Commission has one collection location.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.
- a) Employees that are responsible for cash collections do not share cash drawers/registers.
Performance: Inspected policy manuals, inquired of management, and observed employees do not share cash drawer/register.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Collections (Excluding Electronic Funds Transfers): (Continued)

- b) Each employee responsible for collection of cash is not responsible for preparing/making bank deposits, unless another employee or official is responsible for reconciling collection documentation (e.g., pre-numbered receipts) to the deposit.
Performance: Inspected policy manuals, inquired of management, and observed employees collecting cash are not responsible for making deposits.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

 - c) Each employee responsible for collecting cash is not responsible for posting collection entries to the general ledger or subsidiary ledgers unless another employee/official is responsible for reconciling ledger postings to each other and to the deposit.
Performance: Inspected policy manuals, inquired of management, and observed employees collecting cash do not make general ledger postings.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

 - d) The employee(s) responsible for reconciling cash collections to the general ledger and/or subsidiary ledgers, by revenue source and/or agency fund additions, are not responsible for collecting cash, unless another employee/official verifies the reconciliation.
Performance: Inspected policy manuals, inquired of management, and observed employees collecting cash do not reconcile cash collections to the general ledger.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.
6. Obtain from management a copy of the bond or insurance policy for theft covering all employees who have access to cash. Observe that the bond or insurance policy for theft was enforced during the fiscal period.
Performance: Obtained a listing of all employees who have access to cash and inquired of management if these employees are covered by a bond or insurance policy for theft. Observed that the bond or insurance policy was enforced during the fiscal period.
Exceptions: One employee that is involved in the collections process is not covered by the bond policy for theft.
7. Randomly select 2 deposit dates for each of the 5 bank accounts selected for procedures #3 under "Procedures Performed on the Commission's Bank Reconciliations" above (select the next deposit date chronologically if no deposits were made on the dates randomly selected and randomly select a deposit if multiple deposits are made on the same day). Performance: Observed that the deposits tested were made within one business day of receipt or within one week if the depository is more than 10 miles from collection location or the deposit is less than \$100.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- e) Trace the actual deposit per the bank statement to the general ledger.
Performance: Traced the actual deposit per the bank statement to the general ledger.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Non-Payroll Disbursements (Excluding Card Purchases/Payments, Travel Reimbursements, and Petty Cash Purchases):

- 8. Obtain a listing of locations that process payments for the fiscal period, and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 locations (or all locations if less than 5).
Performance: Obtained a listing of locations that process payments from management and management's representation that the listing is complete in a separate letter.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Non-Payroll Disbursements (Excluding Card Purchases/Payments, Travel Reimbursements, and Petty Cash Purchases): (Continued)

9. For each location selected under #8 above, obtain a listing of those employees involved with non-payroll purchasing and payment functions. Obtain written policies and procedures relating to employee job duties (if the Commission has no written policies and procedures, inquire of employees about their job duties), and observe that job duties are properly segregated such that:

Performance: Obtained a listing of employees involved in non-payroll purchasing and payment functions and reviewed written policies and procedures related to employee job duties. Observed if the job duties were properly segregated.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- a) At least two employees are involved in initiating a purchase request, approving a purchase, and placing an order/making the purchase.

Performance: Obtained a listing of employees involved in initiating a purchase request, approving a purchase, and placing an order/making a purchase. Observed at least two employees are involved.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- b) At least 2 employees are involved in processing and approving payments to vendors.

Performance: Obtained a listing of employees involved in processing and approving payments to vendors. Observed at least 2 employees are involved.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- c) The employees responsible for processing payments is prohibited from adding/modifying vendor files unless another employee is responsible for periodically reviewing changes to vendor files.

Performance: Obtained a listing of employees involved in processing payments to vendors. Observed if any employees involved are adding/modifying vendor files.

Exceptions: The Accountant adds and modifies vendor files.

- d) Either the employee/official responsible for signing checks mails the payment or gives the signed checks to an employee to mail who is not responsible for processing payments.

Performance: Obtained a listing of employees involved with signing and mailing checks.

Exceptions: The Accountant processes payments and mails checks.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Non-Payroll Disbursements (Excluding Card Purchases/Payments, Travel Reimbursements, and Petty Cash Purchases): (Continued)

10. For each location selected under #8 above, obtain the Commission's non-payroll disbursement transaction population (excluding cards and travel reimbursements) and obtain management's representation that the population is complete. Randomly select 5 disbursements for each location, obtain supporting documentation for each transaction and:
- Performance: Obtained the Commission's general ledger for the fiscal period and management's representation that the population is complete.
 - Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.
- a) Observe that the disbursement matched the related original itemized invoice, and that supporting documentation indicates that deliverables included on the invoice were received by the Commission.
- Performance: Obtained the disbursements and observed that the disbursement and the related original invoice agreed and evidence that the deliverables were received.
 - Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.
- b) Observe that the disbursement documentation included evidence (e.g., initial/date, electronic logging) of segregation of duties tested under #9, as applicable.
- Performance: Observed the 5 disbursements included evidence of segregation of duties.
 - Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Credit Cards, Debit Cards, Fuel Cards, P-Cards:

11. Obtain from management a listing of all active credit cards, bank debit cards, fuel cards, and P-Cards (cards) for the fiscal period, including the card numbers and the names of the persons who maintained possession of the cards. Obtain management's representation that the listing is complete.
- Performance: Inquired of management for a listing of all active credit cards, bank debit cards, fuel cards and P-cards for the fiscal period, including the card numbers and the names of the persons who maintain possession of the cards.
 - Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.
12. Using the listing prepared by management, select 5 cards (or all cards if less than 5) that were used during the fiscal period. Randomly select one monthly statement or combined statement for each card (for a debit card, randomly select one monthly bank statement), obtain supporting documentation, and:

**Procedures Performed on the Commission's Credit Cards, Debit Cards, Fuel Cards, P-Cards:
(Continued)**

- a) Observe that there is evidence that the monthly statement or combined statement and supporting documentation (e.g., original receipts for credit/debit card purchases, exception reports for excessive fuel card usage) was reviewed and approved, in writing, (or electronically approved), by someone other than the authorized card holder.
Performance: Observed evidence that the statements and supporting documentation was reviewed and approved, in writing, by someone other than the authorized card holder.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.
 - b) Observe that finance charges and late fees were not assessed on the selected statements.
Performance: Observed finance charges and late fees were not assessed on the selected statements.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.
13. Using the monthly statements or combined statements selected under #12 above, excluding fuel cards, randomly select 10 transactions (or all transactions if less than 10) from each statement, and obtain supporting documentation for the transactions (i.e., each card should have 10 transactions subject to testing). For each transaction, observe that it is supported by:
- a) An original itemized receipt that identifies precisely what was purchased.
Performance: Observed that transactions were supported by original itemized receipts that identifies precisely what was purchased.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.
 - b) Written documentation of the business/public purpose.
Performance: Observed that each transactions includes written documentation of the business/public purpose.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.
 - c) Documentation of the individuals participating in meals (for meal charges only).
Performance: Observed transactions for any meal charges and documentation of the individuals participating in meals.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Travel and Travel-Related Expense Reimbursements (Excluding Card Transactions):

14. Obtain from management a listing of all travel and travel-related expense reimbursements during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing or general ledger is complete. Randomly select 5 reimbursements, obtain the related expense reimbursement forms/prepaid expense documentation of each selected reimbursement, as well as the supporting documentation. For each of the 5 reimbursements selected:

Performance: Obtained a listing of all travel and related expense reimbursements.

Management's representation of the listing was confirmed in a separate letter.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- a) If reimbursed using a per diem, observe that the approved reimbursement rate is no more than those rates established either by the State of Louisiana or the U.S. General Services Administration (www.gsa.gov).

Performance: Inspected travel and expense reimbursement and 2 out of the 5 reimbursements selected used established per diem rates. Observed per diem rates used were the GSA rates.

Exceptions: For 1 mileage reimbursement, the Commission reimbursed \$0.58 per mile, while the established mileage rate was \$0.56.

- b) If reimbursed using actual costs, observe that the reimbursement is supported by an original itemized receipt that identifies precisely what was purchased.

Performance: Inspected travel and expense reimbursement and 3 out of the 5 reimbursements selected used actual costs. Observed that expenses using actual costs were supported by an itemized receipt.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- c) Observe that each reimbursement is supported by documentation of the business/public purpose (for meal charges, observe that the documentation includes the names of those individuals participating) and other documentation required by written policy (procedures #lh).

Performance: Inspected travel and expense reimbursements to observe that expenses included the business purpose.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- d) Observe that each reimbursement was reviewed and approved, in writing, by someone other than the person receiving the reimbursement.

Performance: Inspected travel and expense reimbursements to observe that expenses included approval by someone other than the person receiving the reimbursement.

Exceptions: 2 of the 5 reimbursements did not include evidence of approval in writing by someone other than the person receiving the reimbursement.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Contracts:

15. Obtain from management a listing of all agreements/contracts for professional services, materials and supplies, leases, and construction activities that were initiated or renewed during the fiscal period. Obtain management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 contracts (or all contracts if less than 5) from the listing, excluding the practitioner's contract and:

Performance: Observed the listing of all contracts initiated or renewed during the fiscal year from management and received management's representation of completeness in a separate letter.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- a) Observe that the contract was bid in accordance with the Louisiana Public Bid Law (e.g., solicited quotes or bids, advertised), if required by law.

Performance: Inspected supporting contract documentation and inquired of client about any contracts subject to Louisiana Public Bid Law. All 5 contracts selected were for services; Public Bid law was not applicable.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- b) Observe that the contract was approved by the governing body/board, if required by policy or law (e.g., Lawrason Act, Home Rule Charter).

Performance: Inspected contract documentation.

Exceptions: 3 of the 5 selected contracts were not approved in the meeting minutes.

- c) If the contract was amended (e.g., change order), observe that the original contract terms provided for such an amendment and that amendments were made in compliance with the contract terms (e.g., if approval is required for any amendment was approval documented).

Performance: Inspected contracts and inquired of management about amendments to contracts in the fiscal year. No contracts were amended in the fiscal year.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- d) Randomly select one payment from the fiscal period for each of the 5 contracts, obtain the supporting invoice, agree the invoice to the contract terms, and observe that the invoice and related payment agreed to the terms and conditions of the contract.

Performance: Obtained supporting documentation for payments for each contract and agreed payment to terms of the contract.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Payroll and Personnel:

16. Obtain a listing of employees and officials employed during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 employees or officials, obtain related paid salaries and personnel files, and agree paid salaries to authorized salaries/pay rates in the personnel files.

Performance: Obtained a listing of employees during the fiscal year from management and received management's representation of completeness in a separate letter.

Randomly selected 5 employees and agreed paid salaries to authorized salaries or pay rates per the personnel files.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

17. Randomly select 1 pay period during the fiscal period. For the 5 employees or officials selected under #16 "Procedures Performed on the Commission's Payroll and Personnel" above, obtain attendance records and leave documentation for the pay period, and:

- a) Observe that all selected employees or officials documented their daily attendance and leave (e.g., vacation, sick, compensatory).

Performance: Inspected time sheets for record of attendance and leave during the period.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- b) Observe that supervisors approved the attendance and leave of the selected employees or officials.

Performance: Inspected time sheets for the approval of attendance and leave by the supervisor for the selected employee.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- c) Observe that any leave accrued or taken during the pay period is reflected in the Commission's cumulative leave records.

Performance: Observed the leave records maintained by the office manager to ensure leave taken during the period was reflected in the records.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- d) Observe that the rate paid to the employees or officials agree to the authorized salary/pay rate found within the personnel file.

Performance: Observed the authorized salary/pay rate maintained in the personnel files and agreed to rate paid.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Payroll and Personnel: (Continued)

18. Obtain a listing of those employees or officials that received termination payments during the fiscal period and management's representation that the list is complete. Randomly select 2 employees or officials, obtain related documentation of the hours, and pay rates used in management's termination payment calculations, and the Commission's policy on termination payments. Agree the hours to the employees' or officials' cumulative leave records, agree the pay rates to the employees' or officials' authorized pay rates in the employees' or officials' personnel files and agree the termination payment to the Commission policy.

Performance: Obtained a listing of employees terminated during the fiscal year from management and received management's representation of completeness in a separate letter. Agreed the hours to cumulative leave records, agreed the pay rates to the authorized pay rates, and agreed the termination payment to the Commission's policy.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

19. Obtain management's representation that employer and employee portions of third-party payroll related amounts (e.g., payroll, taxes, retirement contributions, health insurance premiums, garnishments, and workers' compensation premiums, etc.) have been paid, and associated forms have been filed, by required deadlines.

Performance: Obtained representation that employer's and employee's portion of third-party related amounts were paid and filed by the required deadline.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedure Performed on the Commission's Ethics:

20. Using the 5 selected employees/officials from procedure #16 under "Procedures Performed on the Commission's Payroll and Personnel", obtain ethics documentation from management and:

- a) Observe that the documentation demonstrates each employee or official completed one hour of ethics training during the fiscal period.

Performance: Observed that selected employee's files included documentation of ethics training completed during the fiscal year.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

- b) Observe whether the entity maintains documentation which demonstrates each employee and official were notified of any changes to the Commission's ethical policy during the fiscal period, as applicable.

Performance: Observed the documentation demonstrating the employees agree to the ethics training and policy.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Debt Service:

21. Obtain a listing of bonds/notes and other debt instruments issued during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Select all debt instruments on the listing, obtain supporting documentation, and observe that the State Bond Commission approval was obtained for each bond/note issued.

Performance: Inquired of management regarding a listing of bonds/notes issued during the fiscal period and obtained management's representation in a separate letter. Examined documentation for State Bond Commission approval.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

22. Obtain a listing of bonds/notes outstanding at the end of the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing of bonds/notes and other debt instruments is complete. Randomly select one bond/note, inspect debt covenants, obtain supporting documentation for the reserve balance and payments, and agree actual reserve balances and payments to those required by debt covenants (including contingency funds, short-lived assets funds, or other funds required by the debt covenants).

Performance: Inquired of management regarding a listing of bonds/notes outstanding at the end of the fiscal period and received management's representation the listing is complete in a separate letter. Inspected bond documents for debt covenants and tested for compliance with the covenants.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Fraud Notice:

23. Obtain a listing of misappropriations of public funds or assets during the fiscal period, and management's representation that the listing is complete. Select all misappropriations on the listing, obtain supporting documentation, and observe that the Commission reported the misappropriation(s) to the legislative auditor and the district attorney of the parish in which the Commission is domiciled.

Performance: Inquired of management of any misappropriations of public funds or assets, none were noted.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

24. Observe that the Commission has posted on its premises and website, the notice required by R.S. 24:523.1 concerning the reporting of misappropriation, fraud, waste, or abuse of public funds.

Performance: Inquired if the fraud notice is posted on the premises and website concerning the reporting of misappropriation, fraud, waste, or abuse of public funds.

Exceptions: Did not observe fraud notice posted on the premises, and the Commission does not have a website.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Information Technology Disaster Recovery/Business Continuity:

25. Perform the following procedures, verbally discuss the results with management, and report "We performed the procedure and discussed the results with management".

a) Obtain and inspect the Commission's most recent documentation that it has backed up its critical data (if no written documentation, inquire of personnel responsible for backing up critical data) and observe that such backup occurred within the past week. If backups are stored on a physical medium (e.g., tapes, CDs), observe evidence that backups are encrypted before being transported.

Performance: We performed the procedures and discussed the results with management.

b) Obtain and inspect the Commission's most recent documentation that it has tested/verified that its backups can be restored (if no written documentation, inquire of personnel responsible for testing/verifying backup restoration) and observe evidence that the test/verification was successfully performed within the past 3 months.

c) Obtain a listing of the Commission's computers currently in use and their related locations, and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 computers and observe while management demonstrates that the selected computers have current and active antivirus software and that the operating system and accounting system software in use are currently supported by the vendor.

Performance: We performed the procedures and discussed the results with management.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Sexual Harassment:

26. Using the 5 randomly selected employees/officials from procedure #16 under "Procedures Performed on the Commission's Payroll and Personnel" above, obtain sexual harassment training documentation from management, and observe the documentation demonstrates each employee/official completed at least one hour of sexual harassment training during the calendar year.

Performance: Examined sexual harassment training documentation for the 5 employees tested.

Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Sexual Harassment: (Continued)

27. Observe the Commission has posted its sexual harassment policy and complaint procedure on its website (or in a conspicuous location on the Commission's premises if the Commission does not have a website).
Performance: Inquired of management regarding the sexual harassment policy and complaint procedure on its website. The Commission does not have a website; however, the policy was posted on the Commission's premises.
Exceptions: There were no exceptions noted.
28. Obtain the Commission's annual sexual harassment report for the current fiscal period, observe that the report was dated on or before February 1, and observe it includes the applicable requirements of R.S. 42:344:
- a) Number and percentage of public servants in the Commission who have completed the training requirements;
Performance: Inquired of management regarding the Commission's annual sexual harassment report for the fiscal period.
Exceptions: There was no report filed during the fiscal period.
- b) Number of sexual harassment complaints received by the Commission;
Performance: Inquired of management regarding the Commission's annual sexual harassment report for the fiscal period.
Exceptions: There were no sexual harassment complaints received by the Commission; however, no report was filed for the fiscal period.
- c) Number of complaints which resulted in a finding that sexual harassment occurred;
Performance: Inquired of management regarding the Commission's annual sexual harassment report for the fiscal period.
Exceptions: There were no sexual harassment complaints received by the Commission; however, no report was filed for the fiscal period.
- d) Number of complaints in which the finding of sexual harassment resulted in discipline or corrective action, and
Performance: Inquired of management regarding the Commission's annual sexual harassment report for the fiscal period.
Exceptions: There were no sexual harassment complaints received by the Commission; however, no report was filed for the fiscal period.

Procedures Performed on the Commission's Sexual Harassment: (Continued)

e) Amount of time it took to resolve each complaint.

Performance: Inquired of management regarding the Commission's annual sexual harassment report for the fiscal period.

Exceptions: There were no sexual harassment complaints received by the Commission; however, no report was filed for the fiscal period.

Management's Overall Response to Exceptions:

- 1i Management will consider adding the required provisions to the existing ethics policy.
- 1k Management will consider adding the required provisions to the existing information technology disaster recovery/business continuity policy.

Management will prepare and make public the annual sexual harassment report containing the applicable requirements of R.S. 42:344 on or before the February 1 deadline.
