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

### INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

Louisiana Auctioneers Licensing Board Department of Economic Development State of Louisiana

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Louisiana Auctioneers Licensing Board (Board), a component unit of the Department of Economic Development, State of Louisiana, as of and for the year ended June 30, 1999, as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the management of the Board. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in <u>Government Auditing Standards</u>, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to in the first paragraph present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Board, as of June 30, 1999, and the results of its operations for the fiscal year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

In accordance with <u>Government Auditing Standards</u>, we have also issued a report dated July 16, 1999 on our consideration of the Board's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements taken as a whole. The information presented on pages 15 and 16 is presented for purpose of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

### A. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The Louisiana Auctioneers Licensing Board (the Board) is a component unit of the State of Louisiana (the State) created within the Louisiana Department of Economic Development, as provided by Louisiana Revised Statutes 37:3111. The Board is composed of seven members, appointed by the Governor, who serve terms concurrent to the term of office of the Governor appointing them, except that each member shall serve until his successor has been appointed and begins

serving. The Board is charged with the responsibility to contribute to the safety, health and property of the people of the State in the transfer of property by auction. Operations of the Board are funded with self-generated license, examination and other related fees.

In April of 1984, the Financial Accounting Foundation established the Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) to promulgate generally accepted accounting principles and reporting standards with respect to activities and transactions of the state and local governmental entities. In June of 1987, the GASB issued a revised codification of governmental accounting and financial reporting standards. The codification and subsequent GASB pronouncements are recognized as generally accepted accounting principles for state and local government.

The Board prepares its financial statements in accordance with the standards established by the GASB. GASB Codification Section 2100 establishes

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### criteria for determining the governmental reporting entity and has defined the

governmental reporting entity to be the State of Louisiana. The accompanying

statements present only transactions of the Board, a component unit of the State.

Annually the State issues general purpose financial statements which include the activity contained in the accompanying financial statements. The general purpose financial statements are issued by the Louisiana Division of Administration-Office of Statewide Reporting and Accounting Policy and audited by the Louisiana Legislative Auditor.

### B. FUND ACCOUNTING

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The accounts of the Board are organized into a general fund, a special revenue fund and two account groups, each of which is considered a separate

accounting entity. The operations of the funds are accounted for with a set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues and expenditures.

The funds and account groups presented in the financial statements are described as follows:

### <u>General Fund</u>

The general fund is used to account for the general operations of the Board. The various revenues and expenditures are accounted for in this fund. <u>Special Revenue Fund</u>

The special revenue fund is used to account for the proceeds of the investments placed in the "Auctioneer Recovery Fund" established to pay claims to persons injured by licensees.

### Account Groups

The two account groups are not "Funds." They are concerned only with the

### measurement of financial position, not with measurement of results of

operations.

### C. BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenditures are recognized and reported in the financial statements. Basis of accounting relates to the timing of the measurements made, regardless of the measurement focus applied. The Board's records are maintained on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under the modified accrual basis of accounting all revenue is recognized when measurable and available rather than when earned, and all expenditures are recognized when the obligation is incurred.

### D. BUDGET PRACTICES

Budgets are prepared and adopted by the Board annually. The budget for fiscal year ended June 30, 1999 was adopted at the November 20, 1997 Board

meeting.

In accordance with Louisiana Revised Statutes 39:1331 the Board submits a copy of its proposed budget and any subsequent amendments for the ensuing fiscal year to the Joint Legislative Committee on the Budget, to each chairman of a standing committee of the legislature having jurisdiction as listed in R.S. 49:968, to the Legislative Auditor, and the Legislative Fiscal Office. The proposed budget is due no later than the first day of January. The Board monitors the budget and makes changes, when deemed appropriate. The Board amended the budget for fiscal year ended June 30, 1999 on June 21, 1998 and on November 17, 1998. Budgets are prepared on the modified accrual basis of accounting, including the changes in fund balance.

All funds budgeted are immediately available, as the Board's operations are financed with self-generated revenues. Therefore, the budget is known as a non-appropriated budget.

### The Board does not follow the encumbrances method of accounting.

### E. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

For reporting purposes, cash and cash equivalents include cash, demand deposits, time deposits and certificates of deposit. Under state law the Board may deposit funds within a fiscal agent bank selected and designated by the Board. Further, the Board may invest in time certificates of deposit of state banks organized under the laws of Louisiana, national banks having their principal office in the state of Louisiana, in savings accounts or shares of savings and loan associations and savings banks and in share accounts and share certificate accounts of federally or state-chartered credit unions.

As reflected on the balance sheet, the Board had cash and cash equivalents totaling \$129,823 at June 30, 1999. Cash and cash equivalents are

stated at cost, which approximates market. Under state law these deposits must be secured by federal deposit insurance or the pledge of securities owned by the fiscal agent bank. The market value of the pledged securities plus the federal deposit insurance must at all times equal the amount on deposit with the fiscal agent. As of June 30, 1999, the amount on deposit was secured as follows:

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### **INVESTMENTS**

Under Louisiana Revised Statute 37:3144, the Board shall establish the "Auctioneer Recovery Fund" for payment of claims to persons injured by licensees. The Board holds this fund in a Money Market Account at Bank One. G. VACATION AND SICK LEAVE

The Board has the following policy related to annual and sick leave. The earning of annual and sick leave is based on the equivalent of full-time state service. It is credited at the end of each regular pay period of 80 hours of regular duty.

Accrued unused annual and sick leave shall be carried forward to the succeeding calendar years without limitation. Annual leave must be applied

for by the employee and may be used only when approved by the Board. Upon retirement or resignation, unused annual leave of up to 300 hours is paid to employees at the employee's current rate of pay.

Upon retirement or resignation, the employee is not paid for any unused sick leave. Annual leave in excess of 300 hours and sick leave are used in the retirement benefit computation as earned service.

At June 30, 1999, the employee of the Board had accumulated and vested \$114 of employee leave benefits, which was computed in accordance with GASB Codification Section C60, as modified by GASB Statement Number 16. Of this amount \$114 is recorded as an obligation of the General Fund and no dollar amount is recorded within the General Long-Term Debt Account Group.

### TOTAL COLUMNS ON STATEMENTS Η.

The total column on the Balance Sheet is captioned Memorandum Only to indicate that it is presented only to facilitate financial analysis. Data in this column does not present financial position in conformity with generally

### accepted accounting principles. Neither is such data comparable to a

consolidation.

### GENERAL FIXED ASSETS

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Fixed assets used in the governmental fund type operations are accounted for in the General Fixed Assets Account Group, rather than in governmental funds. Depreciation has not been provided for on these fixed assets. All fixed assets are valued at historical cost or estimated historical cost.

### PENSION PLAN

The Board's employee participates in the Louisiana State Employees' Retirement System (LASERS). In addition to the employee contribution withheld at 7.5% of gross salary, the Board contributes an additional 12.4% of gross salary. Current year contributions to the system are funded through employee and employer contributions of \$777 and \$1,285 respectively. The total current year payroll of the agency was \$10,362 and its current year payroll covered by the retirement system was \$10,362. Under present statutes, the Board does not guarantee any of the benefits granted by the retirement system.

### K. POSTRETIREMENT HEALTH CARE AND LIFE INSURANCE BENEFITS

The Board may provide certain continuing health care and life insurance benefits for its retired employees. Substantially all of the Board employees become eligible for those benefits if they reach normal retirement age while

### working for the Board.

Those benefits for retirees and similar benefits for active employees are provided through an insurance company whose monthly premiums are paid jointly by the employees and by the Board. The Board recognizes the cost of providing the benefits (Board's portion of premiums) as an expenditure when paid during the year. The Board has no retired employees, and at present does not provide life insurance benefits.

### LEASES

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The Board rents its office space under an operating lease and shares the rent expense equally with the Louisiana State Board of Examiners of Interior Designers. The lease expense is included in operating expenditures and the

total rent expense for the fiscal year ended June 30, 1999 was \$6,071. The final payment on the lease will be November 1, 2000. Annual lease expense under the lease term is as follows:

The Board may terminate the lease after 60 days notice in the event the State of Louisiana provides adequate space in a state-owned building.

### GENERAL LONG-TERM OBLIGATIONS Μ.


Long-term obligations expected to be financed from governmental funds are accounted for in the general long-term debt account group, not in the governmental funds.

### N. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Board had an informal agreement with the Louisiana State Board of Examiners of Interior Designers (LSBEID) to share furniture and equipment, payroll costs, and office expenses. At June 30, 1999 this Board owes LSBEID \$100. In late summer 1999 this agreement will end when the Auctioneers Board relocates to its own office space.

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### O. LITIGATION

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At June 30, 1999, there was no litigation pending against the Board.

## INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT ON COMPLIANCE AND ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH <u>GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS</u>

Louisiana Auctioneers Licensing Board Department of Economic Development Baton Rouge, Louisiana

We have audited the financial statements of the Louisiana Auctioneers Licensing Board (Board), a component unit of the Department of Economic Development, State of Louisiana, as of and for the year ended June 30, 1999, and have issued our report thereon dated July 16, 1999. We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and the standards applicable to financial reporting contained in <u>Government Auditing</u> <u>Standards</u>, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

### <u>Compliance</u>

As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the Board's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit and, accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed no instances of noncompliance that are required to be reported under <u>Government Auditing Standards</u>.

## Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Board's internal control over financial reporting in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control over financial reporting. Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control over financial reporting that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that misstatements in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions.

### We noted no matters involving the internal control over financial reporting

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and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses. However, we noted other matters involving the internal control over financial reporting that we have reported to the management of the Board in a separate letter dated July 16, 1999.

This report is intended for the information of the Board's management and the Legislative Audit Advisory Committee. However, this report is a matter of public record and its distribution is not limited.

This schedule of per diem paid to board members is presented in compliance with House Concurrent Resolution No. 54 of the 1979 Session of the Louisiana Legislature. Board members were paid \$97 for each board meeting they attended, as authorized by Louisiana Revised Statute 37:3111.

### SUMMARY OF PRIOR AUDIT FINDINGS

- 1.) We noted in our last three audit letters dated September 11, 1996, August 5, 1997 and July 23, 1998, respectively, that the Board was not in compliance with state travel regulations. The Board changed its procedures to require travel forms to be completed prior to reimbursement of expenses. This has resolved this finding.
- 2.) We noted in our audit letter dated July 23, 1998 that the Board was not withholding taxes from the members' per diem in accordance with Internal Revenue Service. During this year the Board was in compliance with the withholding requirements and this finding was resolved.
- 3.) We noted in our audit letter dated July 23, 1998 that some of the assets were not properly tagged and that some of the assets were no longer in use. All assets were properly tagged during this audit period and the surplus assets were disposed of in accordance with state guidelines.
- 4.) We noted in our audit letter dated July 23, 1998 that the budgets for fiscal year ended June 30, 1998 and 1999 were in a deficit position. These deficits were funded by the Recovery Fund. Since this fund balance is restricted to Recovery Fund activities, it is not available to fund operations. The current budget corrected this finding.

- 5.) We noted in our audit letter dated July 23, 1998 that legal expenditures exceeded the \$20,000 cap per the contractual agreement that the Board entered into with its attorney. This did not recur during the current audit period and is considered resolved.
- 6.) We noted in our audit letter dated July 23, 1998 that the Board held the assets of the "Auctioneer Recovery Fund" in a brokerage firm account. This was not in accordance with state depository requirements. These funds were transferred to a bank issued certificate of deposit which resolves this finding.
- 7.) We noted in our audit letter dated July 23, 1998 that the board had transferred \$10,000 from the Recover Fund to its operating account to reimburse attorney fees the board incurred in handling complaints resolved through the fund. Your attorney provided statutory authority to make such transfer. This finding is considered resolved.

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the Louisiana Auctioneers Licensing Board (Board) for the year ended June 30 1999, we considered its internal control structure in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure.

We previously reported on the Board's internal control structure in our report dated July 16, 1999. This letter does not affect our report dated July 16, 1999 on the financial statements of the Board. However, during our audit, we noted the following item that is an opportunity for strengthening internal controls and operating efficiency.

The Louisiana Licensing Agency Budget Act as contained in Louisiana Revised Statute 39:1338 requires the Board to notify the Joint Legislative Committee on the Budget of any "decrease in the submitted budget if the change will constitute...five percent of the total dollars in the budget as submitted." The actual revenues for the year were nine percent under budget. The Board should more closely monitor its budget. Written notification should be given when variances exceed prescribed levels.

We will review the status of this matter during our next audit engagement. We have already discussed this matter with Board management. We will be pleased to perform any additional study of this matter or to assist in implementation of procedures to rectify it.


In response to the audit findings included in the management letter dated July 16, 1999 we offer the following <u>Corrective Action Plan</u>:
