#### **Independent Auditor's Report**

Board of Commissioners Housing Authority of Winnsboro Winnsboro, Louisiana Regional Inspector General for Audit Office of Inspector General Department of Housing and Urban Development

We have audited the accompanying general-purpose combined financial statements of the Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana at and for the year ended September 30, 2003, as listed in the table of contents. These general-purpose combined financial statements are the responsibility of the Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general-purpose combined financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the general-purpose combined financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana as of September 30, 2003, the results of its operations, changes in its total net assets and statement of cash flows for the year then ended, in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued a report dated February 26, 2004 on our consideration of Housing Authority of Winnsboro's internal control over financial reporting and our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grants. That report is an integral part on an audit performed in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in Government Auditing Standards and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our audit.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the combined general-purpose financial statements of the Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana taken as a whole. The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards and other supplementary information is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, and is not a required part of the accompanying financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the accompanying financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements taken as a whole.

The accompanying Financial Data Schedules required by HUD are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

#### YEAR ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 2003

**NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES** The accompanying general-purpose financial statements of the Housing Authority of the City of Winnsboro have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles.

**A. BASIS OF PRESENTATION** Housing Authorities are chartered as a public corporation under the laws (LSA-R.S. 40:391) of the state of state for the purpose of providing safe and sanitary dwelling accommodations. This creation was contingent upon the local governing body of the city declaring a need for the Housing Authority to function in such city. The Housing Authority is governed by a five-member board of Commissioners. The members, appointed by the Honorable Mayor of the City of Winnsboro, serve staggered multi-year terms.

Under the United States Housing Act of 1937, as amended, the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) has direct responsibility for administering low-rent housing programs in the United States. Accordingly, HUD has entered into an annual contributions contract with the Housing Authority for the purpose of assisting the Housing Authority in financing the acquisition, construction and leasing of housing units and to make annual contributions (subsidies) to the Housing Authority for the purpose of maintaining this low-rent character.

The Housing Authority had 150 units in Low Rent management in one project.

**B. REPORTING ENTITY** GASB Statement 14 establishes criteria for determining the governmental reporting entity and component units that should be included within the reporting entity. Under provisions of this Statement, the Housing Authority is considered a *primary government*, since it is a special purpose government that has a separate governing body, is legally separate, and is fiscally independent of other state or local governments. As used in GASB Statement 14, fiscally independent means that the Housing Authority may, without the approval or consent of another governmental entity, determine or modify its own budget, levy its own taxes or set rates or charges, and issue bonded debt.

The Housing Authority is a related organization of the City of Winnsboro since the City of Winnsboro appoints a voting majority of the Housing Authority's governing board. The City of Winnsboro is not financially accountable for the Housing Authority as it cannot impose its will on the Housing Authority and there is no potential for the Housing Authority to provide financial benefit to, or impose financial burdens on, the City of Winnsboro. Accordingly, the Housing Authority is not a component unit of the financial reporting entity of the City of Winnsboro.

#### YEAR ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 2003

Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Codification Section 2100 establishes criteria for determining which, if any, component units should be considered part of the Housing Authority for financial reporting purposes. The basic criterion for including a potential component unit within the reporting entity is financial accountability. The GASB has set forth criteria to be considered in determining financial accountability, which includes:

- 1. Appointing a voting majority of an organization's governing body, and:
  - a. The ability of the Housing Authority to impose its will on that organization's body, and:
  - b. The potential for the organization to provide specific financial benefits to or impose specific financial burdens on the Housing Authority.
- 2. Organizations for which the Housing Authority does not appoint a voting majority but are fiscally dependent on the Housing authority.
- 3. Organizations for which the reporting entity financial statements would be misleading if data of the organization is not included because of the nature or significance of the relationship.

Based on the previous criteria, the Housing Authority has determined that there are no component units that should be considered as part of the Housing Authority reporting entity.

**C. FUNDS** The accounts of the Housing Authority are organized and operated on the basis of funds. A fund is an independent fiscal and accounting entity with a self-balancing set of accounts. Fund accounting segregates funds according to their intended purpose and is used to aid management in demonstrating compliance with finance related legal and contractual provisions. The minimum number of funds is maintained consistent with legal and managerial requirements.

All funds of the Housing Authority are classified as proprietary. Proprietary funds account for activities similar to those found in the private sector, where the determination of net income is necessary or useful to sound financial administration. Proprietary funds differ from governmental funds in that their focus is on income measurement, which together with the maintenance of equity, is an important financial indicator.

Proprietary funds are accounted for on the flow of economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded at the time the liabilities are incurred. With this measurement focus for all assets and all liabilities associated with the operation of these funds are included on the balance sheet. The Housing Authority has elected, pursuant to GASB Statement No. 20, to apply all GASB pronouncements and only FASB pronouncements issued before November 30, 1989.

#### D. BUDGETS

<u>General Budget Policies</u> The following summarizes the budget activities of the Housing Authority during the year ended September 30, 2003:

#### YEAR ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 2003

The Housing Authority adopted budgets for all HUD-funded programs. The budget is controlled by fund at the function level. All appropriations lapse at year end. Budgets are prepared on the modified accrual basis of accounting.

The Executive Director is authorized to transfer amounts between line items within any fund, with the exception of salaries, provided such does not change the total of any function.

**E. CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS** Cash equivalents include amounts in time deposits and those investments with original maturities of 90 days of less. Under state law, the Housing Authority may deposit funds in demand deposits, interest-bearing demand deposits, money market accounts, or time deposits with state banks organized under state law and national banks having their principal offices in state.

Under state law, the Housing Authority may invest in United States bonds, treasure notes, or certificates. These are classified as investments if their original maturities exceed 90 days; however, if the original maturities are 90 days or less, they are classified as cash equivalents. Investments are state at the lower of market or cost.

**F. INVESTMENTS** Investments are limited by R.S. 33:2955 and the Housing Authority's investment policy. If the original maturities of investments exceed 90 days they are classified as investments; however, if the original maturities are 90 days or less, they are classified as cash equivalents.

The investments are reflected at quoted market prices except for the following which are required/permitted as per GASB Statement No. 31:

Investments in <u>nonparticipating</u> interest-earning contracts, such as nonnegotiable certificates of deposit with redemption terms that do not consider markets rates, are reported using a cost-based measure.

The Housing Authority reported at amortized cost money market investments <u>participating</u> interest-earning investment contracts that have a remaining maturity at time of purchase of one year or less.

#### Definitions:

Interest-earning investment contract include time deposits with financial institutions (such as certificates of deposit), repurchase agreements, and guaranteed investment contracts.

Money market investments are short-term, highly liquid debt instruments that include U.S. Treasury obligations.

#### YEAR ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 2003

- **G. SHORT-TERM INTERFUND RECEIVABLES/PAYABLES** During the course of operations, numerous transactions occur between individual funds for services rendered. These receivables and payables are classified as due from other funds or due to other funds on the balance sheet. Short-term interfund loans are classified as interfund receivables/payables.
- **H. INVENTORY AND PREPAID ITEMS** Inventories consist of expendable supplies held for consumption stated on a lower of cost or market on a first-in, first-out basis. They are reported at cost which is recorded as an expenditure at the time individual inventory items are used.

Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items. Prepaid expenses consist of prepaid insurance.

I. FIXED ASSETS Fixed assets are recorded at historical cost and depreciated over their estimated useful lives (excluding salvage value). Donated capital assets are recorded at their estimated fair value at the date of donation. Estimated useful life is management's estimate of how long the asset is expected to meet service demands. *Interest costs during construction have not been capitalized*. Straight-line depreciation is used based on the following estimated useful lives:

Site improvements	15 years
Buildings	25 years
Building improvements	15 years
Furniture and fixtures	5 to 7 years
Computers	3 years

**J. COMPENSATED ABSENCES** The Housing Authority follows state Civil Service regulations for earning of accumulated annual and sick leave, for all employees.

Employees covered by Civil Service regulations (classified employees) may accumulate up to three hundred hours of annual leave which may be received upon termination or retirement.

For unclassified employees, they accumulate annual leave hours up to three hundred hours, for one to ten years of service. Per Board approved policy, unclassified employees may accumulate in excess of three hundred hours, for more than ten years of service. At termination or retirement, the number of hours paid for may not exceed a calculated percentage of the PHA's operating reserve.

All employees accumulate sick leave hours, but the employee is not paid for them if not used by his/her retirement or termination date.

**K. DEFERRED REVENUES** The Housing Authority reports deferred revenues on its combined balance sheet. Deferred revenues arise when resources are received by the Housing Authority before it has a legal claim to them, as when grant monies are received prior to the incurrence of qualifying expenditures. In subsequent periods, when the Housing Authority has a legal claim to the resources, the liability for deferred revenue is removed from the combined balance sheet and the revenue is recognized.

#### YEAR ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 2003

- **L. USE OF ESTIMATES** The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statement and the reported amounts off revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.
- **NOTE 2 CASH, CASH EQUIVALENTS, AND INVESTMENTS** Both cash deposits and investments held at a financial institution can be categorized according to three levels of risk. These three levels of risk are:
- Category 1 Insured or collateralized with securities held by the entity or by its agent in the entity's name
- Category 2 Collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent in the entity's name
- Category 3 Uninsured and unregistered investments held by the counter-party, its trust department, or its agent, but not in the Authority's name

At September 30, 2003 the Housing Authority has Cash equivalents, and investments totaling \$450,545 as follows:

Under state law, these deposits (or the resulting bank balances) must be secured by federal deposit insurance or the pledge of securities owned by the fiscal agent bank. The market value of the pledged securities plus the federal deposit insurance must at all times equal the amount on deposit with the fiscal agent. These securities are held in the name of the pledging fiscal agent bank in a holding or custodial bank that is mutually acceptable to both parties. At September 30, 2003, the Housing Authority's carrying amount of deposits was \$450,545 and the bank balance was \$459,803. Of the bank balance, \$200,000 was covered by federal depository insurance (GASB Category 1). The remaining \$259,803 was collateralized with securities held by the pledging financial institution's trust department or agent but in the Housing Authority's name (GASB Category 2).

Investments during the year were solely in time deposits at banks.

**NOTE 5 – RETIREMENT SYSTEM** The Housing Authority participates in a defined contribution plan. Through this plan, the Housing Authority provides pension benefits for all of its full-time employees. All full-time employees are eligible to participate in the plan from the first anniversary date of the employment.

Under a defined contribution plan, benefits depend solely on amounts contributed to the plan plus investment earnings. Each participant in the plan is required to make a monthly contribution equal to 1.5 percent of his effective compensation. The participants' portion was frozen when the PHA began participating in social security. The employer is required to make monthly contributions equal to 4 percent of each participant's effective compensation.

The Housing Authority's contribution for each employee and income allocated to the employee's account is fully vested after five years of continuous service. The Housing Authority's contributions and interest forfeited by employees who leave employment before five years of service are used to offset future contributions of the Housing Authority.

#### YEAR ENDED SEPTEMBER 30, 2003

The Housing Authority's contributions were calculated using the base salary amount of \$132,450. The Housing Authority made the required contributions of \$7,363 for the year ended September 30, 2003, of which \$5,298 was paid by the Housing Authority and \$2,065 was paid by employees. No payments were made out of the forfeiture account.

**NOTE 6 – ACCOUNTS PAYABLE** The payables of \$19,374 at September 30, 2003, are as follows:

**NOTE 7 – COMPENSATED ABSENCES** At September 30, 2003, employees of the Housing Authority have accumulated and vested \$39,913 of employee leave benefits, which was computed in accordance with GASB Codification Section C60. These amounts are recorded as liabilities in the funds from which payment will be made.

#### **NOTE 9 – COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES**

<u>Litigation</u> The Housing Authority is not presently involved in litigation.

<u>Construction Projects</u> There are certain renovation or construction projects in progress at September 30, 2003. These include modernizing rental units. These projects are being funded by HUD. Funds are requested periodically as the cost is incurred.

Grant Disallowances The Housing Authority participates in a number of federally assisted grant programs. Although the grant programs have been audited in accordance with the Single Audit Act Amendments of 1996 and OMB circular No. A-133 through September 30, 2003, these programs are still subject to compliance audits. Housing Authority management believes that the amount of disallowances, if any, which may arise from future audits will not be material.

- 2. The distribution of costs by project as shown on the Final Statement of Modernization Cost dated July 18, 2003 accompanying the Actual Modernization Costs Certificate submitted to HUD for approval is in agreement with the PHA's records.
- 3. All modernization costs have been paid and all related liabilities have been discharged through payment.

Report on Compliance with Requirements Applicable to Each

We have audited the compliance of the Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana with the types of compliance requirements described in the *U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133 Compliance Supplement* that are applicable to each of its major federal programs for the year ended September 30, 2003. The Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana's major federal programs are identified in the summary of auditor's results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. Compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts and grants applicable to each of its major federal programs is the responsibility of the Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana's Management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on the Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana's compliance based on our audit.

We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and OMB Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*. Those standards and OMB Circular A-133 require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program occurred. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence about the Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana's compliance with those requirements and performing such other procedures as we consider necessary in the circumstances. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion. Our audit does not provide a legal determination on the Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana's compliance with those requirements.

In our opinion, the Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana complied, in all material respects, with the requirements referred to above that are applicable to each of its major federal programs for the year ended September 30, 2003. We noted one immaterial instance of noncompliance on the major program. It is the one audit finding.

#### Internal Control Over Compliance

The management of The Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana is responsible for establishing and maintaining internal control over compliance with requirements of laws, regulations, contracts and grants applicable to federal programs. In planning and performing our audit, we considered the Housing Authority of Winnsboro, Louisiana's internal control over compliance with requirements that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on compliance and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance with OMB Circular A-133.

Our consideration of the internal control over compliance would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control that might be material weaknesses. A material weakness is a condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control components does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that noncompliance with applicable requirements of laws, regulations, contracts and grants that would be material in relation to a major federal program being audited may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. We noted no matters involving the internal control over compliance and its operation that we consider to be material weaknesses.

#### Compliance

**NOTE 1 – GENERAL** The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards presents the activity of all federal awards programs of the Housing Authority of the City of Winnsboro, Louisiana (the "Housing Authority"). The Housing Authority reporting entity is defined in note 1(A) to the Housing Authority's general-purpose financial statements. Federal awards received directly from federal agencies, as well as federal awards passed through other government agencies, is included on the schedule.

**NOTE 2 – BASIS OF ACCOUNTING** The accompanying Schedule of Expenditures of Federal Awards is presented using the accrual basis of accounting, which is described in note 1(C) to the Housing Authority's general-purpose financial statements.

**NOTE 3 – RELATIONSHIP TO GENERAL-PURPOSE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS** Federal awards revenues are reported in the Housing Authority's general-purpose financial statements as follows:

**NOTE 4 – RELATIONSHIP TO FEDERAL FINANCIAL REPORTS** Amounts reported in the accompanying schedule agree with the amounts reported in the related federal financial reports except for changes made to reflect amounts in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles.

**NOTE 5 – MAJOR FEDERAL AWARDS PROGRAMS** The dollar threshold of \$300,000 was used to distinguish between Type A and Type B federal programs. For those funds that have matching revenues and state funding, federal expenditures were determined by deducting matching revenues from total expenditures. In accordance with HUD Notice PIH 98-14, "federal awards" do not include Housing Authority operating income from rents or investments (or other non-federal sources). In addition, debt service annual contribution payments made by HUD directly to fiscal agents for holders of Housing Authority bonds or for Housing Authority notes held by the federal financing bank (FFB), are not considered when determining if the Single Audit Act "federal awards expended" threshold is met by the Housing Authority in a fiscal year. In addition, the entire amount of operating subsidy received during the fiscal year is considered to be "expended" during the fiscal year.

#### Statement of Condition

In two of the twelve tenant files we reviewed, we noted that income was verified by an inspection of a periodic paycheck. In three instances, income should have been verified as it was on the other ten files we reviewed, in writing with the source.

#### Criteria

The PHA should verify all income with the sources preferably via the internet. If this is not possible, a written verification should be attempted.

#### Effect and Questioned Costs

It appears none. For one exception, the source was social security. In the other instance, the source was teacher's retirement.

#### Cause

The PHA believed this was sufficient verification at the time these two annual recertifications were done.

#### Recommendation

The PHA should adopt a policy regarding income verification, or revise its ACOP. The policy should include the following verification preferences, in order of first to last:

- 1) via the internet
- 2) third party written unanswered requests should be kept
- 3) check stubs and/or telephone
- 4) resident provides information

The above has been discussed in detail with the Executive Director.
