To the Board of Directors of The Healthy School Food Collaborative, Inc. New Orleans, Louisiana

Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The Healthy School Food Collaborative, Inc. (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2021, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the fiscal year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Organization

The Healthy School Food Collaborative, Inc. (the Organization) is a Louisiana non-profit corporation organized to reduce childhood obesity by providing students, families, and communities access to nutritious and affordable food sources, sustainable, healthy meal choices, and by promoting the development of lifelong healthy dietary and living behaviors. To achieve these goals, the Organization partners with charter schools, private schools and other non-profit organizations. The Organization is exempt from Federal Income Taxes under Section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Accordingly, revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Basis of Presentation

In accordance with the provisions of Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) as set forth in FASB ASC 958, which established standards for external financial reporting by not-for-profit organizations, the Organization classifies resources for accounting and reporting purposes into two net asset categories which are with donor restrictions and without donor restrictions. A description of these two net asset categories is as follows:

- Net assets without donor restrictions include funds not subject to donor-imposed stipulations. The revenues received and expenses incurred in conducting the mission of the Organization are included in this category. The Organization has determined that any donor-imposed restrictions for current or developing programs and activities are generally met within the operating cycle of the Organization and therefore, their policy is to record those net assets as without donor restrictions.
- Net assets with donor restrictions include funds that are subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both. When a restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions

At June 30, 2021, the Organization had no net assets with donor restrictions.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

For the purposes of the statement of cash flows, the organization considers all unrestricted highly liquid investments with a maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Property and Equipment

Expenditures for the acquisition of property and equipment are capitalized at cost. The fair value of donated property and equipment is similarly capitalized. The Organization's threshold for capitalization is \$5,000. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method for financial reporting purposes over the following estimated useful lives:

Leasehold Improvements 7 years

Concentration of Credit

The Organization maintains cash accounts with one commercial bank. At June 30, 2021, the balance exceeded the federal insured amount of \$250,000 by \$2,019,415.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing the various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the Statement of Activities. Accordingly, certain costs have been allocated among the programs and supporting services benefitted based on the time spent on each program.

Income Taxes

The Organization is a not-for-profit organization that is exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code and classified by the Internal Revenue Services as other than a private foundation.

The Organization's Forms 990, *Return of Organization Exempt from Income Tax*, for the years ending December 31, 2019, 2020 and 2021 are subject to examination by the IRS, generally for three years after they were filed.

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (CONTINUED)

Revenue Recognition

Contributions, including promises to give, are considered conditional or unconditional, depending on the nature and existence of any donor or grantor conditions.

A contribution or promise to give contains a donor or grantor condition when both of the following are present:

- An explicit identifying of a barrier, that is more than trivial, that must be overcome before the revenue can be earned and recognized.
- An implicit right of return of assets transferred or a right of release of a donor or grantor's obligation to transfer assets promised, if the condition is not met.

Unconditional contributions, or conditional contributions in which the conditions have been substantially met or explicitly waived by the donor, are recorded as revenue with or without donor restrictions, depending on the existence and nature of any donor restrictions. When a restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. Conditional contributions are recognized when the barriers to entitlement are overcome and the promises become unconditional. Unconditional contributions are recognized as revenue when received. Grants are either recorded as contributions or exchange transactions based on criteria contained in the grant award. Exchange transactions are reimbursed based on a predetermined rate for services performed. The revenue is recognized in the period the service is performed.

NOTE 4 – ECONOMIC DEPENDENCY

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021, 100% of total support and revenue was received from the Summer Food Service Program. The grant amounts are appropriated each year by federal and state governments. If significant budget cuts are made at the federal, state and/or local level, the amount of funds the Organization receives could be reduced significantly and could have an adverse impact on its operations. Revenue for the year ended June 30, 2021 is as follows:

<u>NOTE 5 – FEDERAL COMPLIANCE CONTINGENCIES</u>

The Organization receives all of its revenues from government grants and contracts, all of which are subject to audit by the governments. The ultimate determination of amounts received under these programs generally is based upon allowable costs reported to and are subject to audit by the government. Until such audits, if any, there exists a contingency to refund any amount received in excess of allowable cost. Management is of the opinion that no material liability will result from such audits.

NOTE 6 – RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The project management for the Organization's operations were provided by a related entity for half of the fiscal year. This for-profit entity is owned and controlled by the Organization's CEO. During the second half of the year, the Organization took over the project management tasks. Total expenses incurred to the related party entity during the year ended June 30, 2021 was \$140,150, which is recorded in Contract Services in the Statement of Activities. As of June 30, 2021, the Organization had an outstanding payable balance to the related party in the amount of \$18,008.

NOTE 7 - COVID-19 GLOBAL PANDEMIC

In December 2019, an outbreak of a novel strain of coronavirus (COVID-19) spread across multiple countries, including the United States. On March 11, 2020, the World Health Organization characterized COVID-19 as a pandemic. In addition, multiple jurisdictions in the United States have declared a state of emergency. It is anticipated that these impacts will continue for some time. Future potential impacts may include disruptions to the Organization's operations and the ability for the Organization's employees to perform their tasks.

NOTE 8 – SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

Management of the Organization has evaluated all subsequent events through July 5, 2022, the date the financial statements were available to be issued. No additional disclosures are considered necessary.

Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of The Healthy School Food Collaborative, Inc.'s internal control.

However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed an instance of noncompliance or other matters that are required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards* and which are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs as Finding No. 2021-001.

Healthy School Food Collaborative Inc.'s response to the finding identified in our audit is described in the accompanying Schedule of Findings and Questioned Costs. Healthy School Food Collaborative Inc.'s response was not subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements, and, accordingly, we express no opinion on it.

The purpose of this report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the organization's internal control or on compliance. PART II – FINANCIAL STATEMENT FINDINGS

<u>FINDING #2021-001 – TIMELY SUBMISSION OF ANNUAL AUDIT REPORT</u> (NONCOMPLIANCE)

CRITERIA:

Louisiana state statue 2:511 - 2:559, Louisiana Audit Law, states that quasi-public entities with more than \$500,000 in revenue must submit their audited annual financial reports to the Louisiana Legislative Auditor within six (6) months of the close of the auditee's fiscal year. The Organization was granted emergency extensions through March 31, 2022.

CONDITION:

The Organization did not remit the annual audited financial statements to the Louisiana Legislative Auditor within the extended deadline.

CAUSE:

The Organization did not provide the auditors with the necessary financial information and audit testing support in a timely manner to meet the deadline.

EFFECT:

Late submission causes the auditee to be placed on the non-compliance list and can result in withholding of funding to the auditee.

RECOMMENDATION:

The Organization should implement policies and procedures to ensure timely filing of any and all required reports.

MANAGEMENT RESPONSE:

We will begin the auditing process in a timely fashion going forward and adhere to stricter timelines internally to prevent this from recurring.
