Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of East Baton Rouge Truancy Assessment Inc. (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2023 and 2022, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the years then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of East Baton Rouge Truancy Assessment Inc. as of June 30, 2023 and 2022, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the years then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the East Baton Rouge Truancy Assessment Inc. and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the East Baton Rouge Truancy Assessment Inc. 's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and Government Auditing Standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.

- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the East Baton Rouge Truancy Assessment Inc. 's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the East Baton Rouge Truancy Assessment Inc. 's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Prior Period Financial Statements

The financial statements of the East Baton Rouge Truancy Assessment, Inc. as of June 30, 2022, were audited by another auditor whose report dated December 15, 2022, expressed an unmodified opinion on those statements. In our opinion, the summarized comparative information presented herein as of and for the year ended June 30, 2022, is consistent, in all material respects, with the audited financial statements from which it has been derived.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The accompanying Schedule of Compensation, Reimbursements, Benefits, and Other Payments to Agency Head, Political Subdivision Head, or Chief Executive Officer, as required by Louisiana Revised Statute 24:513 (A)(3), is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the schedule of expenditures of federal awards is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated March 20, 2024, on our consideration of the East Baton Rouge Truancy Assessment Inc. 's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the East Baton Rouge Truancy Assessment Inc. 's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards in considering the East Baton Rouge Truancy Assessment Inc. 's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

NOTE 1: SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Nature of Operations – East Baton Rouge Truancy Assessment, Inc. (the Organization) is a Louisiana non-profit organization incorporated February 21, 2001, operating in East Baton Rouge parish, for the purpose of identifying children who have exhibited truant tendencies, assessing the causal problems for these tendencies, and providing services or referring the identified children and their families to necessary services to eliminate or alleviate the causal problems for the truant behavior.

The organization operates the following programs: Truancy Assessment Service Center (TASC) and Family and Youth Service Center (FYSC).

TASC – Designed to provide early identification, rapid assessment, and intensive truancy reduction services to at-risk students in grades kindergarten through fifth grade. The TASC program targets children that are most in need of services as well as "high-risk" schools. TASC is funded by the Louisiana Commission on Law Enforcement.

FYSC – Designed to offer services for youth and families in a convenient and caring environment, FYSC is funded by the East Baton Rouge Parish School Board, Sheriff's Office, District Attorney's Office, Mayor-President's Office, and private grants.

<u>Basis of Presentation</u> – The financial statements were prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with generally accepted accounting principles. The statement of activities presents expenses of the Organization functionally by program services, fundraising, and management and general.

The financial statements include certain prior-year summarized comparative information in total but not by net asset class. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Organization's financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2022, from which the summarized information was derived.

Financial Statement Presentation — The Organization reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets that are based upon the existence or absence of restrictions on use that are placed by its donors: net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions. Net assets with donor restrictions are subject to donor-imposed restrictions. Some donor-imposed restrictions are temporary in nature, such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions are perpetual in nature, such as those that the donor stipulates resources be maintained in perpetuity. Net assets without donor restrictions are resources available to support operations and not subject to donor restrictions. The only limits on the use of net assets without donor restrictions are the broad limits resulting from the nature of the Organization, the environment in which it operates, the purposes specified in corporate documents and its application for tax-exempt status, and any limits resulting from contractual agreements with creditors and others that are entered into in the course of its operations. When a donor's restriction is satisfied, either by using the resources in the manner specified by the donor or by the passage of time, the expiration of the restriction is reporting in the financial statements by reclassifying the net assets from net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions. The Organization does not have any net assets with donor restrictions for the year ended June 30, 2023.

<u>Estimates</u> – The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates. Estimates are used primarily when accounting for the allowance for doubtful accounts, depreciation, prepaid assets, accrued liabilities, and non-financial contributions.

<u>Cash and Cash Equivalents</u> – For purposes of the statements of cash flows, the Organization considers all highly liquid investments, both restricted and unrestricted, with an initial maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

NOTE 1: SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

<u>Receivables</u> – Bad debts are charged to operations in the year in which the account is determined uncollectible. If the reserve method of accounting for uncollectible accounts were used, it would not have a material effect on the financial statements. No amounts for an allowance for bad debts have been established as the Organization expects to collect the balance in full. The Organization does not require any collateral for its receivables.

Revenue and Revenue Recognition – Revenue is recognized when earned. Program service fees and payments under cost-reimbursable grants or contracts received in advance are deferred to the applicable period in which the related services are performed, or expenditures are incurred, respectively. Contributions are recognized when cash, or other assets, an unconditional promise to give, or notification of a beneficial interest is received. Conditional promises are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been substantially met or the donor has explicitly released the restriction.

Revenue With and Without Donor Restrictions – Contributions received are recorded as increases in net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions, depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. When a restriction expires, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the Statement of Activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Rental Income - Rental income is recognized when due from tenants, generally upon the first day of each month.

<u>Property and Equipment</u> – Purchased property and equipment is recorded at cost. Acquisitions of land, buildings, and improvements, furniture and equipment in excess of \$500 are capitalized. Depreciation is calculated using the straightline method over the estimated useful life of the assets. Estimated useful lives range from 5 to 15 years for most furniture, equipment, and major improvements and 39 years for buildings.

Depreciation expense was \$46,432 and \$45,724 for years ended June 30, 2023 and 2022, respectively.

Repair and maintenance costs are expensed as incurred. When property and equipment are retired or otherwise disposed, the cost and accumulated depreciation are removed from the accounts and any resulting gain or loss is included in the results of operations for the respective year.

<u>Leases</u> – Lease determination and classification is recorded at the commencement date. Both operating and finance leases are included in leased equipment, current liabilities, and long-term lease liabilities on the balance sheet. Right-of-use ("ROU") assets (see Note 4) represent out right to use an underlying asset for the lease term and lease liabilities represent our obligation to make lease payments arising from the leases. ROU assets and liabilities are recognized at commencement date based on the present value of lease payments over the lease term. As most of our leases do not provide an implicit rate, we elected to use a risk-free rate at commencement date in accordance with accounting standards. Operating lease ROU assets also include any lease payments made and excludes lease incentives. Our lease terms include options to extend or terminate when we are reasonably certain of that outcome. Lease expense for lease payment is recognized on a straight-line basis over lease term. Lease agreements may contain both lease and non-lease components, which are generally accounted for separately.

<u>Income Taxes</u> – The Organization has been recognized by the Internal Revenue Service as a not-for-profit organization as described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and is exempt from federal and state income taxes. Accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been made; however, if the Organization should engage in activities unrelated to the purpose for which it was created, taxable income could result. The Organization had no unrelated business income for the year ended June 30, 2023 and 2022.

NOTE 1: SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

<u>Expense Allocation</u> – Directly identifiable expenses are charges to programs and supporting services. Expenses related to more than one function are charged to programs and supporting services on the basis of periodic time and expense studies. General and administrative expenses include those expenses that are not directly identifiable with any other specific function but provide for the overall support and direction of the Organization.

<u>Reclassifications</u> – Certain accounts in the prior-year financial statements have been reclassified for comparative purposes to conform to the presentation in the current-year financial statements.

NOTE 2: INCOME TAXES

The Organization follows FASB Accounting Standards Codification, which provides guidance on accounting for uncertainty in income taxes recognized in an organization's financial statements. The guidance prescribes a recognition and measurement of a tax position taken or expected to be taken in a tax return and also provides guidance on derecognition, classification, interest and penalties, accounting in interim periods, disclosure, and transition. As of June 30, 2023, the Organization had no uncertain tax positions that qualify for either recognition or disclosure in the financial statements. Generally, the tax years prior to June 30, 2020, are no longer subject to examination by federal, state, or local taxing authorities.

NOTE 5: LINE OF CREDIT

The Organization has a \$20,000 revolving line of credit with a bank, of which \$1,193 was drawn as of June 30, 2023 and 2022, bearing interest of 7.25% per annum, unsecured.

NOTE 6: NON-FINANCIAL CONTRIBUTIONS

The East Baton Rouge Parish School System and the Sheriff's Office provide services by employees on an in-kind basis. The estimated value of these non-financial contributions of the employees' time is \$93,760 and \$93,760 for the years ended June 30, 2023 and 2022, respectively.

The Louisiana Department of Education provides office space on an in-kind basis. The estimated value of these non-financial contributions of the facilities' rent is \$347,460 and \$351,696, respectively, for the year ended June 30, 2023 and 2022, and is recognized in the statement of activities.

NOTE 7: OPERATING LEASES

The Organization leases the facilities that it holds from the Louisiana Department of Education as non-financial contributions to various other entities under separate operating leases. All leases are initiated as one-year lease. As of June 30, 2023, all tenants lease their space on a month-to-month basis.

NOTE 8: BOARD OF DIRECTORS' COMPENSATION

The Board of Directors is a voluntary board, receiving no compensation or per diem.

NOTE 9: CONCENTRATIONS

The Organization receives revenue through grants and contracts administered by the State of Louisiana. The grant contract amounts are appropriated each year by the state government. If significant budget cuts were to be made at the state level, the amount of funds received by the organization could be reduced by an amount that could adversely impact its operations. Management is not aware of any actions that will adversely affect the amount of grants and contracts the organization will receive in the next fiscal year.

NOTE 11: NEW ACCOUNTING PRONOUNCEMENTS

In January 2023, the Organization adopted Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2020-07, Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958), Presentation and Disclosures by Not-for-Profit Entities Contribute Nonfinancial Assets. The ASU required nonprofits to change their financial statement presentation and disclosure of contributed nonfinancial assets, or gifts-in-kind. The FASB issued the update in an effort to improve transparency in reporting nonprofit gifts-in-kind. The Organization's adoption of ASU No. 2020-07 did not result in any quantitative adjustments to their financial statement presentation.

In February 2016, the FASB issues ASC No. 2016-02, Leases (Topic ASC 842) intended to improve financial reporting regarding leasing transactions. The new standard affects all companies and organizations that lease assets. The standard requires organizations to recognize, on the balance sheet, the assets and liabilities for the rights and obligations created by those leases if the lease terms are more than 12 months. The guidance also will require qualitative and quantitative disclosures providing additional information about the amounts recorded in the financial statements. Lessors are required to make additional disclosures with regards to assets leased to others. The Organization's adoption of ASU No. 2016-02 did not result in any adjustment to their financial statement presentation.

The accounting for a lessor under Topic ASC 842 is substantially unchanged from current leasing standards. The vast majority of operating leases should continue to be classified as operating leases. However, certain aspects of the lessor accounting model have been aligned with the new revenue recognition guidance introduced by FASB ASC 606, Revenue from Contracts with Customers. The Organization elected not to reassess at adoption: (i) expired or existing contracts to determine whether they are or contain a lease, (ii) the lease classification of any existing leases, or (iii) initial direct costs for existing leases. The adoption did not result in a significant effect on amounts reported in the statement of operations for the year ended June 30, 2023.

NOTE 12: RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

During 2023, the Organization borrowed funds from related parties. From time to time, the Organization borrows funds from the East Baton Rouge Parish School System and other parties to fill funding gaps. These loans do not have a maturity date, interest rate, or required monthly payments. As of June 30, 2023 and 2022, these loans totaled \$156,656 and \$169,876, respectively.

NOTE 13: SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

In August 2023, the Organization transferred TASC to the control of the East Baton Rouge District Attorney's Office. A motion was approved by the Board to rename the Organization to the Family and Youth Services Center.

In preparing these financial statements, the Organization has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through March 20, 2024, the date the financial statements were available to be issued.

2022-001 Segregation of duties

Condition: Due to the relatively small size of the organization, ideal segregation of duties cannot

be achieved. This is a repeat finding from the prior year.

Criteria: The organization should separate responsibilities for authorizing transactions, recording

transactions, and custody of assets.

Cause: The size of the organization does not permit proper segregation of duties.

Effect: The lack of segregation of duties increases the risk of fraud related to misappropriation

of assets, financial statement misstatement, or both.

Auditor's Recommendation: While it may not be cost effective to justify implementing a full

segregation of duties for an extensive system of internal control in all areas, I believe that it is important that management and those charged with governance be made aware that some weakness exists and that they should continue to apply diligent oversight and

monitoring of activities.

Management's Response: The organization implemented all suggested safeguards. Debit card

purchases are approved by the director and a Board member. Bank reconciliations are performed by a bookkeeper on a monthly basis, and the reports are provided to Board members at each monthly board

meeting. Checks in excess of \$500 require dual signatures.

Management will continue to work more efficiently and diligently with the Board in providing information and documents to assist in

improving oversight and monitoring of all activities.





INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANT'S REPORT ON APPLYING AGREED-UPON PROCEDURES

We have performed the procedures enumerated below on the control and compliance (C/C) areas identified in the Louisiana Legislative Auditor's (LLA's) Statewide Agreed-Upon Procedures (SAUPs) for the fiscal period July 1, 2022, through June 30, 2023. East Baton Rouge Truancy Assessment, Inc.'s management is responsible for those C/C areas identified in the SAUPs.

Written Policies and Procedures

 - b) Bank reconciliations include evidence that a member of management/board member who does not handle cash, post ledgers, or issue checks has reviewed each bank reconciliation (e.g., initialed and dated, electronically logged); and
 - c) Management has documentation reflecting it has researched reconciling items that have been outstanding for more than 12 months from the statement closing date, if applicable.

Collections (excluding electronic funds transfers)

4. Obtain a listing of deposit sites for the fiscal period where deposits for cash/checks/money orders (cash) are prepared and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 deposit sites (or all deposit sites if less than 5).

- 5. For each deposit site selected, obtain a listing of collection locations and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select one collection location for each deposit site (i.e., 5 collection locations for 5 deposit sites), obtain and inspect written policies and procedures relating to employee job duties (if no written policies or procedures, inquire of employees about their job duties) at each collection location, and observe that job duties are properly segregated at each collection location such that:
 - a) Employees responsible for cash collections do not share cash drawers/registers.
 - b) Each employee responsible for collecting cash is not responsible for preparing/making bank deposits, unless another employee/official is responsible for reconciling collection documentation (e.g., pre-numbered receipts) to the deposit.
 - c) Each employee responsible for collecting cash is not responsible for posting collection entries to the general ledger or subsidiary ledgers, unless another employee/official is responsible for reconciling ledger postings to each other and to the deposit.
 - d) The employee(s) responsible for reconciling cash collections to the general ledger and/or subsidiary ledgers, by revenue source and/or agency fund additions, are not responsible for collecting cash, unless another employee/official verifies the reconciliation.

No Exceptions Noted.

6. Obtain from management a copy of the bond or insurance policy for theft covering all employees who have access to cash. Observe the bond or insurance policy for theft was enforced during the fiscal period.

No Exceptions Noted.

- 7. Randomly select two deposit dates for each of the 5 bank accounts selected for procedure #3 under "Bank Reconciliations" above (select the next deposit date chronologically if no deposits were made on the dates randomly selected and randomly select a deposit if multiple deposits are made on the same day). Alternately, the practitioner may use a source document other than bank statements when selecting the deposit dates for testing, such as a cash collection log, daily revenue report, receipt book, etc. Obtain supporting documentation for each of the 10 deposits and:
 - a) Observe that receipts are sequentially pre-numbered.
 - b) Trace sequentially pre-numbered receipts, system reports, and other related collection documentation to the deposit slip.
 - c) Trace the deposit slip total to the actual deposit per the bank statement.
 - d) Observe the deposit was made within one business day of receipt at the collection location (within one week if the depository is more than 10 miles from the collection location or the deposit is less than \$100 and the cash is stored securely in a locked safe or drawer).
 - e) Trace the actual deposit per the bank statement to the general ledger.

Non-Payroll Disbursements (excluding card purchases/payments, travel reimbursements, and petty cash purchases)

- 8. Obtain a listing of locations that process payments for the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 locations (or all locations if less than 5). *No Exceptions Noted.*
- 9. For each location selected under #8 above, obtain a listing of those employees involved with non-payroll purchasing and payment functions. Obtain written policies and procedures relating to employee job duties (if the agency has no written policies and procedures, inquire of employees about their job duties), and observe that job duties are properly segregated such that:
 - a) At least two employees are involved in initiating a purchase request, approving a purchase, and placing an order/making the purchase.
 - b) At least two employees are involved in processing and approving payments to vendors.
 - c) The employee responsible for processing payments is prohibited from adding/modifying vendor files, unless another employee is responsible for periodically reviewing changes to vendor files.
 - d) Either the employee/official responsible for signing checks mails the payment or gives the signed checks to an employee to mail who is not responsible for processing payments.

For each location selected under #8 above, obtain the entity's non-payroll disbursement transaction population (excluding cards and travel reimbursements) and obtain management's representation that the population is complete.  - a) Observe whether the disbursement matched the related original itemized invoice and supporting documentation indicates deliverables included on the invoice were received by the entity.

b) Observe whether the disbursement documentation included evidence (e.g., initial/date, electronic logging) of segregation of duties tested under #9, as applicable.

Credit Cards/Debit Cards/Fuel Cards/P-Cards

11. Obtain from management a listing of all active credit cards, bank debit cards, fuel cards, and P-cards (cards) for the fiscal period, including the card numbers and the names of the persons who maintained possession of the cards. Obtain management's representation that the listing is complete.

- 12. Using the listing prepared by management, randomly select 5 cards (or all cards if less than 5) that were used during the fiscal period. Randomly select one monthly statement or combined statement for each card (for a debit card, randomly select one monthly bank statement), obtain supporting documentation, and:
 - a) Observe whether there is evidence that the monthly statement or combined statement and supporting documentation (e.g., original receipts for credit/debit card purchases, exception reports for excessive fuel card usage) were reviewed and approved, in writing (or electronically approved), by someone other than the authorized card holder.
 - b) Observe that finance charges and late fees were not assessed on the selected statements.

13. Using the monthly statements or combined statements selected under #12 above, excluding fuel cards, randomly select 10 transactions (or all transactions if less than 10) from each statement, and obtain supporting documentation for the transactions (i.e., each card should have 10 transactions subject to testing). For each transaction, observe it is supported by (1) an original itemized receipt that identifies precisely what was purchased, (2) written documentation of the business/public purpose, and (3) documentation of the individuals participating in meals (for meal charges only). For missing receipts, the practitioner should describe the nature of the transaction and note whether management had a compensating control to address missing receipts, such as a "missing receipt statement" that is subject to increased scrutiny.

Travel and Travel-Related Expense Reimbursements (excluding card transactions)

- 14. Obtain from management a listing of all travel and travel-related expense reimbursements during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing or general ledger is complete.  - b) If reimbursed using actual costs, observe the reimbursement is supported by an original itemized receipt that identifies precisely what was purchased.
 - c) Observe each reimbursement is supported by documentation of the business/public purpose (for meal charges, observe that the documentation includes the names of those individuals participating) and other documentation required by written policy (procedure #1h).

d) Observe each reimbursement was reviewed and approved, in writing, by someone other than the person receiving reimbursement.

Contracts

Obtain from management a listing of all agreements/contracts for professional services, materials and supplies, leases, and construction activities that were initiated or renewed during the fiscal period. Alternately, the practitioner may use an equivalent selection source, such as an active vendor list. Obtain management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select 5 contracts (or all contracts if less than 5) from the listing, excluding the practitioner's contract, and:

 - a) Number and percentage of public servants in the agency who have completed the training requirements.
 - b) Number of sexual harassment complaints received by the agency.
 - c) Number of complaints which resulted in a finding that sexual harassment occurred.
 - d) Number of complaints in which the finding of sexual harassment resulted in discipline or corrective action; and
 - e) Amount of time it took to resolve each complaint.
