Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Community Receiving Home, Inc. d/b/a Renaissance (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2025, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

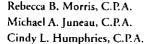
In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Community Receiving Home, Inc. d/b/a Renaissance as of June 30, 2025, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Community Receiving Home, Inc. d/b/a Renaissance and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Community Receiving Home, Inc. d/b/a Renaissance's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the supplementary information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated September 24, 2025, on our consideration of Community Receiving Home, Inc. d/b/a Renaissance's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements and other matters. Notes to Financial Statements

1. Nature of Activities and Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Activities

Community Receiving Home, Inc. d/b/a Renaissance is a nonprofit corporation located in Alexandria, Louisiana, which provides community based multifunction juvenile justice support intervention. Programs include:

- The Detention program provides secure care for juveniles accused of delinquent acts until their trial and placement.
- The Girls Shelter Care provides a safe haven for abused, neglected, runaway, and abandoned children.
- The Girls Residential Home provides long-term treatment and rehabilitation for children who deserve a second chance.

The range of children served includes children who may be delinquent, in need of supervision, neglected, and/or abused.

Primary funding is derived from a parish-wide ad valorem tax administered by the Rapides Parish Police Jury and fees received from the State of Louisiana for various youth services.

Significant Accounting Policies

The significant accounting policies followed are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles. Under this method, revenues are recognized when earned, and expenses are recorded at the time the liabilities are incurred.

Basis of Presentation

Renaissance prepares its financial statements in accordance with Financial Accounting Standards Board. As required by Generally Accepted Accounting Standards, Renaissance reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets: net assets without donor restrictions and net assets with donor restrictions.

 Net assets without donor restrictions — These net assets generally result from revenues generated by receiving contributions that have no donor restrictions, local government support, state government support, service fees, interest earned from the certificates of deposit, and sublease income, less expenses incurred in providing program related services and performing administrative functions.

Notes to Financial Statements

Net assets with donor restrictions – These net assets result from gifts of cash or other assets
that are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets, either
temporarily or permanently, until the donor restriction expires, that is until the stipulated time
restriction ends or the purpose restriction is accomplished, the net assets are restricted.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents consist of petty cash, checking and savings accounts, and certificates of deposit with a maturity within three months of the date acquired.

Certificates of Deposit

Certificates of deposit if any, with maturity dates greater than three months are stated at cost, which approximates market value. Certificates of deposit having a maturity date greater than one year from year-end are considered long-term assets.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivables are reported at the amount expected to be collected. Renaissance maintains an allowance for credit losses to reflect management's estimate of expected future losses on receivables. The allowance is based on historical collection patterns, customer creditworthiness, the aging of receivables, and reasonable and supportable forecasts about future economic conditions. There were no receivables included in the financial statements expected to be uncollectible by management at June 30, 2025, and an allowance for credit losses was not considered necessary.

Prepaid Expenses

Prepaid expenses consist of dues and insurance payments that cover periods beyond June 30, 2025.

Dietary Inventory

Dietary inventory is carried at lower of cost or net realizable value by use of the first-in, first-out method of accounting.

Property and Equipment

All significant acquisitions of property and equipment and all expenditures for repairs, maintenance, renewals, and betterments that materially prolong the useful lives of assets in excess of \$500 are capitalized. Property and equipment, including improvements thereto, are stated at cost or, if acquired by gift, at the estimated market value on the date of gift. The gifts are recorded as support without donor restrictions unless the donor has restricted the donated asset to a specific purpose. Assets donated with explicit restrictions regarding their use and contributions of cash earmarked to acquire property and equipment are reported as support with donor restrictions. Absent donor stipulations regarding how long those donated assets must be maintained, Renaissance reports expirations of donor restrictions when the donated or acquired assets are placed in service. Renaissance reclassifies net assets with donor restrictions to net assets without donor restrictions at that time. Depreciation is computed using the straight-line method over the estimated useful life of the asset.

Notes to Financial Statements

Compensated Absences

Vested or accumulated vacation leave and compensatory time earned is recorded as an expense and liability as the benefits accrue to the employees. An accrual for non-vesting accumulating rights to receive sick pay benefits has not been made in these financial statements because Renaissance does not pay their employees sick time earned upon termination.

Deferred Income

Rental payments are received for land subleased annually. A portion of these payments are considered unearned and reflected in the statement of financial position as deferred income.

Contribution and Grant Recognition

Contributions and grants consist of grants and gifts from individuals, corporations, foundations, and federal, state, and local governmental agencies. Contributions and grants received are recorded as increases in net assets without donor restrictions or net assets with donor restrictions depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. When restrictions expire (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Ad Valorem Tax Recognition

Ad valorem taxes are assessed late in the calendar year. The taxes collected are distributed ratably by the Rapides Parish Police Jury on a monthly basis. Revenue derived from these taxes is recorded as revenue when assessed. The undistributed taxes remaining on June 30, 2025, are included in the accounts receivable balance.

Program Revenue Recognition

Program revenue applies to exchange transactions with customers that are bound by contracts or similar arrangements and establishes a performance obligation approach to revenue recognition. Due to the nature of these transactions, revenue and potential related expenses are influenced by economic factors, such as time of year, health standards, and political mandates. Renaissance records the following exchange transaction revenue in its statement of activities:

<u>Detention Program Revenues</u> – Renaissance charges a daily fee for secure care services provided to juveniles accused of delinquent acts until their trial and placement. Fees for these services are either established by Renaissance or the contracting agency. The services provided through the Detention Program are not separately priced and are, therefore, considered to be one performance obligation, which is satisfied over the period of time during which services are rendered. Payment for these services is due upon receipt of the invoice. This method is consistent with the as-invoiced practical expedient.

Notes to Financial Statements

<u>Girls Shelter Care Program Revenues</u> – Renaissance charges a daily fee for services and housing provided to abused, neglected, runaway, and abandoned children. Fees for these services are established by the contracting agency. The services provided through the Girls Shelter Care Program are not separately priced and are, therefore, considered to be one performance obligation, which is satisfied over the period of time during which services are rendered. Payment for these services is due upon receipt of the invoice. This method is consistent with the as-invoiced practical expedient.

<u>Girls Residential Home Program Revenues</u> – Renaissance charges a daily fee for long-term treatment and rehabilitation services rendered to children who deserve a second chance. Fees for these services are established by the contracting agency. The services provided through the Girls Residential Home Program are not separately priced and are, therefore, considered to be one performance obligation, which is satisfied over the period of time during which services are rendered. Payment for these services is due upon receipt of the invoice. This method is consistent with the as-invoiced practical expedient.

Contribution of Nonfinancial Assets

Renaissance's policy is to recognize contributed professional services if the services received create or enhance nonfinancial assets or required specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation. Contributions of tangible assets and materials are recognized at fair value when received.

Donated facilities, securities, goods and services are recorded at fair market value at the date of donation. Donated services are recognized in the financial statements at their fair value if the services required specialized skills and the services would typically need to be purchased if not donated.

Renaissance pays for most services requiring specific expertise. However, many individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist Renaissance with specific assistance for programs, solicitations, and various committee assignments. No amounts have been recognized in the statement of activities for contributed services, since the services received were not professional in nature and, as such, do not meet the criteria for recognition as donated services.

Income Taxes

Renaissance is a nonprofit organization exempt from income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and comparable Louisiana law. Accordingly, no provision for income taxes has been made in the accompanying financial statements. Renaissance's Form 990 tax returns remain subject to audit by the IRS for three years after filing. At June 30, 2025, the returns for tax years 2022, 2023, and 2024 remain open. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2025, management of Renaissance believes it has adequate support for all material tax positions, and that more likely than not, based on the technical merits, that their position will be sustained upon examination. Renaissance has been classified as an organization that is not a private foundation under Section 509(a)(2) of the code.

Notes to Financial Statements

Advertising Costs

Advertising costs are expensed as incurred and amounted to \$68,722 for the year ended June 30, 2025.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing various programs and other activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the Statement of Activities and in the Statement of Functional Expenses. Accordingly, costs have been allocated on a reasonable and consistent basis among the functional areas benefited. Most of the expenses are charged directly to programs or support services based on specific identification. Certain categories of expenses attributable to administrative support include depreciation, insurance, salaries and benefits, and payroll taxes. These expenses are allocated based on either time and effort or management's estimate of the activities benefited.

Subsequent Events

Management has evaluated subsequent events through September 24, 2025, the date which the financial statements were available for issue. Based upon this evaluation, Renaissance has determined that there are no subsequent events that have occurred which required adjustment to or disclosure in the financial statements.

Custodial credit risk is the risk that in the event of a bank failure, Renaissance's deposits may not be returned. As of June 30, 2025, Renaissance's bank balance of \$1,768,144 was not exposed to custodial credit risk in that \$314,272 was insured through FDIC insurance coverage, and \$1,453,872 was collateralized by securities held by the pledging bank in Renaissance's name.

7. Land Agreement

Renaissance entered into a land agreement with the State of Louisiana, Department of Health and Hospitals on August 1, 1972. The land agreement is for 320.15 acres and began on the 1st day of August 1972 and terminates on the 31st day of July 2071. Once the lease terminates, the property will revert and return to the control of the State of Louisiana, Department of Health and Hospitals. Consideration for this agreement is \$1 and the public benefit to be derived from the operations of Renaissance.

8. Leases

Renaissance as Lessor

On January 1, 2023, a formal lease agreement was entered into with Francis Vanderlick Farms, LLC providing an annual lease payment of \$10,311 payable on the 1st of April each year. The lease term will expire on December 31, 2027.

On July 7, 2012, a formal lease agreement was entered into with the City of Alexandria providing an annual lease payment of \$9,365 (\$125/acre X 74.92 acres) payable on the 15th day of May each year. The rent will increase by 2.75% each year for the term of the lease which will expire on September 31, 2031. The lease term commenced on September 15, 2011.

Total income from leases totaled \$23,577 for the current fiscal year.

9. Retirement Plan

Effective January 1, 2000, Renaissance adopted a deferred profit-sharing plan covering all employees eligible to participate in the plan. Contributions to the plan are made for the benefit of the employee by Renaissance in an amount equal to three percent (3%) of an individual's regular annual salary. Participants shall be permitted to make elective deferrals in any amount from one percent (1%) to ten percent (10%) of their compensation to all available plans. Renaissance will also match up to three percent (3%) of elective deferrals to all available plans. Contributions to the plan for the year ended June 30, 2025, totaled \$35,008.

Renaissance received \$2,279,085 from the parish-wide ad valorem tax during the year ended June 30, 2025. This tax, which was renewed in 2024 for an additional ten years, represented approximately eighty-two percent (82%) of the total revenues and support for the current year.

Additionally, Renaissance has a contract with the State of Louisiana Office of Juvenile Justice (OJJ) to provide juvenile group home residential treatment. This contract was renewed on March 31, 2025 through September 30, 2025. Total amounts received from the State under this contract totaled \$340,287 or twelve percent (12%) of the total revenues for the current year.

11. Liquidity and Availability of Financial Assets

The following reflects Renaissance's financial assets as of June 30, 2025, reduced by amounts not available for general use within one year of the balance sheet date because of contractual or donor-imposed restrictions or internal designations.

As part of Renaissance's liquidity management, they structure their financial assets to be available as general expenditures, liabilities, and other obligations come due. In addition, Renaissance operates with a balanced budget and anticipates covering its general expenditures by collecting sufficient revenues and by utilizing donor-restricted resources from current and prior years' contributions and grant funds.

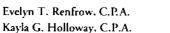

Section II – Financial Statement Findings

Finding 2025-001 - Payroll Recordkeeping

<u>Criteria</u>: Gross pay should be accurately calculated based on approved employee timesheets and authorized pay rates, in accordance with Renaissance's policies and applicable labor regulations.

<u>Condition and Context</u>: Renaissance's workforce includes employees who are eligible for overtime pay as well as those who receive shift differential pay for evening, night, or weekend shifts. During our test of forty payroll disbursements, we noted three instances in which employees' gross pay was inaccurately calculated. Two employees were paid at the incorrect shift differential rate for the shift worked, and one employee was paid at straight time rates for overtime hours worked. As a result, two employees were underpaid, and one employee was overpaid.

<u>Cause and Effect</u>: These errors primarily resulted from the application of either inaccurate shift differential rates or overtime rates when performing the payroll calculations and generating the payroll checks. The application of incorrect pay rates can cause an over or under payment of wages, which can misstate the financial statements if the errors are not detected and corrected, and potentially result in noncompliance with wage regulations.

<u>Recommendation</u>: We recommend that as a routine procedure, the accuracy of the payroll calculation be checked by an employee other than the employee originally preparing the payroll.

Management's Response: See Management's Corrective Action Plan.

Finding 2025-002 - Noncompliance with Procurement Standards - School Lunch Program

<u>Criteria</u>: In accordance with 2 CFR 200.317 through 200.327, entities expending federal funds under the National School Lunch Program must follow the Uniform Guidance procurement standards. These standards require non-federal entities to use documented procurement procedures; maintain records sufficient to detail the history of procurement, including vendor information; provide for full and open competition; and maintain oversight to ensure contractors perform as required. Additionally, 2 CFR 200.302 requires that recipients of federal funds maintain records that identify the source and application of federal program funds and ensure that expenditures are properly tracked.

<u>Condition and Context</u>: The federal funding agency's review of Renaissance's procurement practices under the National School Lunch Program identified the following deficiencies:

- Expenses related to the federal school lunch program were not separately presented in the financial statements, limiting transparency and accountability of federal program costs.
- A complete and current vendor list was not maintained, making it difficult to verify compliance with competitive procurement requirements.
- Adequately documented policies and procedures were not maintained as required by federal regulations.

<u>Cause and Effect</u>: Renaissance did not maintain adequate records and lacked formalized procurement policies and procedures in accordance with federal procurement regulations. As a result, Renaissance was unable to illustrate what products were purchased with federal funds or that they were purchased at a reasonable price from an approved vendor.

Recommendation: The federal funding agency recommends that Renaissance:

- Separately track school lunch program expenses and separately report those expenses in the financial statements.
- Develop and maintain a complete vendor list, including documentation of the selection and procurement history, to support compliance with federal procurement standards.
- Establish and implement formal written policies and procedures that comply with 2 CFR 200.317 through 200.327.

Management's Response: See Management's Corrective Action Plan.

During our test of forty payroll disbursements, we noted three instances in which employees' gross pay was inaccurately calculated. Two employees were paid at the incorrect shift differential rate for the shift worked, and one employee was paid at straight time rates for overtime hours worked. As a result, two employees were underpaid, and one employee was overpaid.

<u>Recommendation</u>: It was recommended that as a routine procedure, the accuracy of the payroll calculation be checked by an employee other than the employee originally preparing the payroll.

<u>Management's Corrective Action Plan</u>: All errors have been corrected, and the employees affected by the inaccuracies have either been compensated for the oversight or collection of an overpayment has been made through payroll reimbursement. The agency has developed a routine procedure which will become effective with the payroll to be dated October 15, 2025. The procedure being that either the Fiscal Director or Administrative Services Director will double check payroll for accuracy of calculation and accuracy of data input.

Independent Accountant's Report on Applying Agreed-Upon Procedures

To the Board of Directors of Community Receiving Home, Inc. d/b/a Renaissance and the Louisiana Legislative Auditor

We have performed the procedures enumerated below on the control and compliance (C/C) areas identified in the Louisiana Legislative Auditor's (LLA's) Statewide Agreed-Upon Procedures (SAUPs) for the fiscal period July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025. Community Receiving Home, Inc. d/b/a Renaissance's (Entity) management is responsible for those C/C areas identified in the SAUPs.

Community Receiving Home, Inc. d/b/a Renaissance has agreed to and acknowledged that the procedures performed are appropriate to meet the intended purpose of the engagement, which is to perform specified procedures on the C/C areas identified in LLA's SAUPs for the fiscal period July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025. Additionally, LLA has agreed to and acknowledged that the procedures performed are appropriate for its purposes. This report may not be suitable for any other purpose. The procedures performed may not address all the items of interest to a user of this report and may not meet the needs of all users of this report and, as such, users are responsible for determining whether the procedures performed are appropriate for their purposes.

The procedures and associated results are as follows:

Written Policies and Procedures

- 1. **Procedure:** Obtain and inspect the Entity's written policies and procedures and observe whether they address each of the following categories and subcategories if applicable to public funds and the Entity's operations:
 - a) Budgeting, including preparing, adopting, monitoring, and amending the budget.
 - b) Purchasing, including (1) how purchases are initiated, (2) how vendors are added to the vendor list, (3) the preparation and approval process of purchase requisitions and purchase orders, (4) controls to ensure compliance with the Public Bid Law, and (5) documentation required to be maintained for all bids and price quotes.
 - c) *Disbursements*, including processing, reviewing, and approving.





- d) Receipts/Collections, including receiving, recording, and preparing deposits. Also, policies and procedures should include management's actions to determine the completeness of all collections for each type of revenue or agency fund additions (e.g., periodic confirmation with outside parties, reconciliation to utility billing after cutoff procedures, reconciliation of traffic ticket number sequences, agency fund forfeiture monies confirmation).
- e) **Payroll/Personnel**, including (1) payroll processing, (2) reviewing and approving time and attendance records, including leave and overtime worked, and (3) approval process for employee rates of pay or approval and maintenance of pay rate schedules.
- f) **Contracting**, including (1) types of services requiring written contracts, (2) standard terms and conditions, (3) legal review, (4) approval process, and (5) monitoring process.
- g) *Travel and Expense Reimbursement*, including (1) allowable expenses, (2) dollar thresholds by category of expense, (3) documentation requirements, and (4) required approvers.
- h) Credit Cards (and debit cards, fuel cards, purchase cards, if applicable), including (1) how cards are to be controlled, (2) allowable business uses, (3) documentation requirements, (4) required approvers of statements, and (5) monitoring card usage (e.g., determining the reasonableness of fuel card purchases).
- i) *Ethics*, including (1) the prohibitions as defined in Louisiana Revised Statute (R.S.) 42:1111-1121, (2) actions to be taken if an ethics violation takes place, (3) system to monitor possible ethics violations, and (4) a requirement that documentation is maintained to demonstrate that all employees and officials were notified of any changes to the Entity's ethics policy.
- j) **Debt Service**, including (1) debt issuance approval, (2) continuing disclosure/EMMA reporting requirements, (3) debt reserve requirements, and (4) debt service requirements.
- k) Information Technology Disaster Recovery/Business Continuity, including (1) identification of critical data and frequency of data backups, (2) storage of backups in a separate physical location isolated from the network, (3) periodic testing/verification that backups can be restored, (4) use of antivirus software on all systems, (5) timely application of all available system and software patches/updates, and (6) identification of personnel, processes, and tools needed to recover operations after a critical event.



I) **Prevention of Sexual Harassment**, including R.S. 42:342-344 requirements for (1) agency responsibilities and prohibitions, (2) annual employee training, and (3) annual reporting.

Results: Not applicable – no prior year exceptions noted.

Board or Finance Committee

- 2. Procedure: Obtain and inspect the board/finance committee minutes for the fiscal period, as well as the board's enabling legislation, charter, bylaws, or equivalent document in effect during the fiscal period, and:
 - a) Observe that the board/finance committee met with a quorum at least monthly, or on a frequency in accordance with the board's enabling legislation, charter, bylaws, or other equivalent document.
 - b) For those entities reporting on the governmental accounting model, review the minutes from all regularly scheduled board/finance committee meetings held during the fiscal year and observe whether the minutes from at least one meeting each month referenced or included monthly budget-to-actual comparisons on the general fund, quarterly budget-to-actual comparisons, at a minimum, on all proprietary funds, and semi-annual budget-to-actual comparisons, at a minimum, on all special revenue funds. Alternately, for those entities reporting on the not-for-profit accounting model, observe that the minutes referenced or included financial activity relating to public funds if those public funds comprised more than 10% of the entity's collections during the fiscal period.
 - c) For governmental entities, obtain the prior year audit report and observe the unassigned fund balance in the general fund. If the general fund had a negative ending unassigned fund balance in the prior year audit report, observe that the minutes for at least one meeting during the fiscal period referenced or included a formal plan to eliminate the negative unassigned fund balance in the general fund.
 - d) Observe whether the board/finance committee received written updates of the progress of resolving audit finding(s), according to management's corrective action plan at each meeting until the findings are considered fully resolved.

Results: During our testing, we noted that the board did not receive written updates of the progress of resolving the audit finding in accordance with management's corrective action plan at each meeting until the finding was considered resolved.



Management's Response: A procedure was developed in response to the finding for the period ending June 30, 2024. The finding was reported to the board, and they were advised of the procedure which had been developed. The procedure dealt with ensuring the accuracy of entries which would not be tested until such time as the agency was preparing for fiscal audit the next year. Entries were reconciled for accuracy, and there were no findings in this regard for the year that has now ended June 30, 2025. This will be conveyed to the directors at the audit debrief at their regularly scheduled meeting in November 2025.

Bank Reconciliations

- 3. Procedure: Obtain a listing of entity bank accounts for the fiscal period from management and management's representation that the listing is complete. Ask management to identify the Entity's main operating account. Select the Entity's main operating account and randomly select four (4) additional accounts [or all accounts if less than five (5)]. Randomly select one (1) month from the fiscal period, obtain and inspect the corresponding bank statement and reconciliation for each selected account, and observe that:
 - a) Bank reconciliations include evidence that they were prepared within two (2) months of the related statement closing date (e.g., initialed and dated or electronically logged);
 - b) Bank reconciliations include written evidence that a member of management or a board member who does not handle cash, post ledgers, or issue checks has reviewed each bank reconciliation within one (1) month of the date the reconciliation was prepared (e.g., initialed and dated or electronically logged); and
 - c) Management has documentation reflecting that it has researched reconciling items that have been outstanding for more than twelve (12) months from the statement closing date, if applicable.

Results: Not applicable – no prior year exceptions noted.

Collections (excluding electronic funds transfers)

4. Procedure: Obtain a listing of deposit sites for the fiscal period where deposits for cash/checks/money orders (cash) are prepared and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select five (5) deposit sites [or all deposit sites if less than five (5)].



- 5. Procedure: For each deposit site selected, obtain a listing of collection locations and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select one (1) collection location for each deposit site [e.g., five (5) collection locations for five (5) deposit sites], obtain and inspect written policies and procedures relating to employee job duties (if there are no written policies or procedures, then inquire of employees about their job duties) at each collection location, and observe that job duties are properly segregated at each collection location such that:
 - a) Employees responsible for cash collections do not share cash drawers/registers;
 - b) Each employee responsible for collecting cash is not also responsible for preparing/making bank deposits, unless another employee/official is responsible for reconciling collection documentation (e.g., pre-numbered receipts) to the deposit;
 - c) Each employee responsible for collecting cash is not also responsible for posting collection entries to the general ledger or subsidiary ledgers, unless another employee/official is responsible for reconciling ledger postings to each other and to the deposit; and
 - d) The employee(s) responsible for reconciling cash collections to the general ledger and/or subsidiary ledgers, by revenue source and/or custodial fund additions, is (are) not also responsible for collecting cash, unless another employee/official verifies the reconciliation.

Results: Not applicable - no prior year exceptions noted.

6. **Procedure:** Obtain from management a copy of the bond or insurance policy for theft covering all employees who have access to cash. Observe that the bond or insurance policy for theft was in force during the fiscal period.

- 7. Procedure: Randomly select two (2) deposit dates for each of the five (5) bank accounts selected for Bank Reconciliations procedure #3 (select the next deposit date chronologically if no deposits were made on the dates randomly selected and randomly select a deposit if multiple deposits are made on the same day). Alternatively, the practitioner may use a source document other than bank statements when selecting the deposit dates for testing, such as a cash collection log, daily revenue report, receipt book, etc. Obtain supporting documentation for each of the ten (10) deposits and:
 - a) Observe that receipts are sequentially pre-numbered.



- b) Trace sequentially pre-numbered receipts, system reports, and other related collection documentation to the deposit slip.
- c) Trace the deposit slip total to the actual deposit per the bank statement.
- d) Observe that the deposit was made within one (1) business day of receipt at the collection location [within one (1) week if the depository is more than ten (10) miles from the collection location or the deposit is less than \$100 and the cash is stored securely in a locked safe or drawer].
- e) Trace the actual deposit per the bank statement to the general ledger.

Results: Not applicable – no prior year exceptions noted.

Non-Payroll Disbursements (excluding card purchases, travel reimbursements, and petty cash purchases)

8. Procedure: Obtain a listing of locations that process payments for the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select five (5) locations [or all locations if less than five (5)].

- 9. Procedure: For each location selected under procedure #8 above, obtain a listing of those employees involved with non-payroll purchasing and payment functions. Obtain written policies and procedures relating to employee job duties (if the agency has no written policies and procedures, then inquire of employees about their job duties), and observe that job duties are properly segregated such that:
 - a) At least two (2) employees are involved in initiating a purchase request, approving a purchase, and placing an order or making the purchase;
 - b) At least two (2) employees are involved in processing and approving payments to vendors:
 - c) The employee responsible for processing payments is prohibited from adding/modifying vendor files, unless another employee is responsible for periodically reviewing changes to vendor files;



- d) Either the employee/official responsible for signing checks mails the payment or gives the signed checks to an employee to mail who is not responsible for processing payments; and
- e) Only employees/officials authorized to sign checks approve the electronic disbursement (release) of funds, whether through automated clearinghouse (ACH), electronic funds transfer (EFT), wire transfer, or some other electronic means.

Results: Not applicable - no prior year exceptions noted.

- 10. Procedure: For each location selected under #8 above, obtain the Entity's non-payroll disbursement transaction population (excluding cards and travel reimbursements) and obtain management's representation that the population is complete. Randomly select five (5) disbursements for each location, obtain supporting documentation for each transaction, and:
 - a) Observe whether the disbursement, whether by paper or electronic means, matched the related original itemized invoice and supporting documentation indicates that deliverables included on the invoice were received by the Entity; and
 - b) Observe whether the disbursement documentation included evidence (e.g., initial/date, electronic logging) of segregation of duties tested under procedure #9 above, as applicable.

Results: Not applicable – no prior year exceptions noted.

11. Procedure: Using the Entity's main operating account and the month selected in Bank Reconciliations procedure #3, randomly select five (5) non-payroll-related electronic disbursements [or all electronic disbursements if less than five (5)] and observe that each electronic disbursement was (a) approved by only those persons authorized to disburse funds (e.g., sign checks) per the Entity's policy, and (b) approved by the required number of authorized signers per the Entity's policy.

Note: If no electronic payments were made from the main operating account during the month selected, the practitioner should select an alternative month and/or account for testing that does include electronic disbursements.



Credit Cards/Debit Cards/Fuel Cards/Purchase Cards (Cards)

12. Procedure: Obtain from management a listing of all active credit cards, bank debit cards, fuel cards, and purchase cards (cards) for the fiscal period, including the card numbers and the names of the persons who maintained possession of the cards. Obtain management's representation that the listing is complete.

Results: No exceptions were found as a result of this procedure.

- 13. Procedure: Using the listing prepared by management, randomly select five (5) cards [or all cards if less than five (5)] that were used during the fiscal period. Randomly select one (1) monthly statement or combined statement for each card [for a debit card, randomly select one (1) monthly bank statement], obtain supporting documentation, and:
 - a) Observe whether there is evidence that the monthly statement or combined statement and supporting documentation (e.g., itemized receipts for credit/debit card purchases, exception reports for excessive fuel card usage) were reviewed and approved, in writing (or electronically approved) by someone other than the authorized card holder (those instances requiring such approval may constrain the legal authority of certain public officials, such as the mayor of a Lawrason Act municipality, should not be reported); and
 - b) Observe that finance charges and late fees were not assessed on the selected statements.

Results: No exceptions were found as a result of this procedure.

14. Procedure: Using the monthly statements or combined statements selected under procedure #13 above, excluding fuel cards, randomly select ten (10) transactions [or all transactions if less than ten (10)] from each statement, and obtain supporting documentation for the transactions [e.g., each card should have ten (10) transactions subject to inspection]. For each transaction, observe that it is supported by (1) an original itemized receipt that identifies precisely what was purchased, (2) written documentation of the business/public purpose, and (3) documentation of the individuals participating in meals (for meal charges only). For missing receipts, the practitioner should describe the nature of the transaction and observe whether management had a compensating control to address missing receipts, such as a "missing receipt statement" that is subject to increased scrutiny.

Results: No exceptions were found as a result of this procedure.



Travel and Travel-Related Expense Reimbursements (excluding card transactions)

- 15. Procedure: Obtain from management a listing of all travel and travel-related expense reimbursements during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing or general ledger is complete. Randomly select five (5) reimbursements and obtain the related expense reimbursement forms/prepaid expense documentation of each selected reimbursement, as well as the supporting documentation. For each of the five (5) reimbursements selected:
 - a) If reimbursed using a per diem, observe that the approved reimbursement rate is no more than those rates established either by the State of Louisiana (doa.la.gov/doa/ost/ppm-49-travel-guide/) or the U.S. General Services Administration (www.gsa.gov);
 - b) If reimbursed using actual costs, observe that the reimbursement is supported by an original itemized receipt that identifies precisely what was purchased;
 - c) Observe that each reimbursement is supported by documentation of the business/public purpose (for meal charges, observe that the documentation includes the names of those individuals participating) and other documentation required by Written Policies and Procedures (procedure #1g); and
 - d) Observe that each reimbursement was reviewed and approved, in writing, by someone other than the person receiving reimbursement.

Results: Not applicable – no prior year exceptions noted.

Contracts

- 16. Procedure: Obtain from management a listing of all agreements/contracts for professional services, materials and supplies, leases, and construction activities that were initiated or renewed during the fiscal period. Alternately, the practitioner may use an equivalent selection source, such as an active vendor list. Obtain management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select five (5) contracts [or all contracts if less than five (5)] from the listing, excluding the practitioner's contract, and:
 - a) Observe whether the contract was bid in accordance with the Louisiana Public Bid Law (e.g., solicited quotes or bids, advertised), if required by law;



- b) Observe whether the contract was approved by the governing body/board, if required by policy or law (e.g., Lawrason Act, Home Rule Charter);
- c) If the contract was amended (e.g., change order), observe that the original contract terms provided for such an amendment and that amendments were made in compliance with the contract terms (e.g., if approval is required for any amendment, the documented approval); and
- d) Randomly select one (1) payment from the fiscal period for each of the five (5) contracts, obtain the supporting invoice, agree the invoice to the contract terms, and observe that the invoice and related payment agreed to the terms and conditions of the contract.

Results: Not applicable - no prior year exceptions noted.

Payroll and Personnel

17. Procedure: Obtain a listing of employees and officials employed during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select five (5) employees or officials, obtain related paid salaries and personnel files, and agree paid salaries to authorized salaries/pay rates in the personnel files.

- **18. Procedure:** Randomly select one (1) pay period during the fiscal period. For the five (5) employees or officials selected under #17 above, obtain attendance records and leave documentation for the pay period, and:
 - a) Observe that all selected employees or officials documented their daily attendance and leave (e.g., vacation, sick, compensatory);
 - b) Observe whether supervisors approved the attendance and leave of the selected employees or officials:
 - c) Observe that any leave accrued or taken during the pay period is reflected in the Entity's cumulative leave records; and



d) Observe the rate paid to the employees or officials agrees to the authorized salary/pay rate found within the personnel file.

Results: Not applicable - no prior year exceptions noted.

19. Procedure: Obtain a listing of those employees or officials that received termination payments during the fiscal period and management's representation that the list is complete. Randomly select two (2) employees or officials and obtain related documentation of the hours and pay rates used in management's termination payment calculations and the Entity's policy on termination payments. Agree the hours to the employee's or official's cumulative leave records, agree the pay rates to the employee's or official's authorized pay rates in the employee's or official's personnel files, and agree the termination payment to Entity policy.

Results: Not applicable – no prior year exceptions noted.

20. Procedure: Obtain management's representation that employer and employee portions of third-party payroll related amounts (e.g., payroll taxes, retirement contributions, health insurance premiums, garnishments, workers' compensation premiums) have been paid, and any associated forms have been filed, by required deadlines.

Results: Not applicable – no prior year exceptions noted.

Ethics

- **21. Procedure:** Using the five (5) randomly selected employees/officials from Payroll and Personnel procedure #17 obtain ethics documentation from management, and:
 - a) Observe whether the documentation demonstrates that each employee/official completed one (1) hour of ethics training during the calendar year as required by R.S. 42:1170; and
 - b) Observe whether the Entity maintains documentation which demonstrates that each employee and official were notified of any changes to the Entity's ethics policy during the fiscal period, as applicable.

Results: Ethics requirements are not applicable to nonprofits.



22. Procedure: Inquire and/or observe whether the agency has appointed an ethics designee as required by R.S. 42:1170.

Results: Ethics requirements are not applicable to nonprofits.

Debt Service

23. Procedure: Obtain a listing of bonds/notes and other debt instruments issued during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Select all debt instruments on the listing, obtain supporting documentation, and observe that State Bond Commission approval was obtained for each debt instrument issued as required by Article VII, Section 8 of the Louisiana Constitution.

Results: Debt service requirements are not applicable to nonprofits.

24. Procedure: Obtain a listing of bonds/notes outstanding at the end of the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select one (1) bond/note, inspect debt covenants, obtain supporting documentation for the reserve balance and payments, and agree actual reserve balances and payments to those required by debt covenants (including contingency funds, short-lived asset funds, or other funds required by the debt covenants).

Results: Debt service requirements are not applicable to nonprofits.

Fraud Notice

25. Procedure: Obtain a listing of misappropriations of public funds and assets during the fiscal period and management's representation that the listing is complete. Select all misappropriations on the listing, obtain supporting documentation, and observe that the Entity reported the misappropriation(s) to the legislative auditor and the district attorney of the parish in which the Entity is domiciled as required by R.S. 24:523.

Results: Not applicable - no prior year exceptions noted.

26. Procedure: Observe the Entity has posted, on its premises and website, the notice required by R.S. 24:523.1 concerning the reporting of misappropriation, fraud, waste, or abuse of public funds.



Information Technology Disaster Recovery/Business Continuity

- 27. Procedure: Perform the following procedures, verbally discuss the results with management, and report "We performed the procedure and discussed the results with management":
 - a) Obtain and inspect the Entity's most recent documentation that it has backed up its critical data (if there is no written documentation, then inquire of personnel responsible for backing up critical data) and observe evidence that such backup (a) occurred within the past week, (b) was not stored on the government's local server or network, and (c) was encrypted.
 - b) Obtain and inspect the Entity's most recent documentation that it has tested/verified that its backups can be restored (if there is no written documentation, then inquire of personnel responsible for testing/verifying backup restoration) and observe evidence that the test/verification was successfully performed within the past three (3) months.
 - c) Obtain a listing of the Entity's computers currently in use and their related locations, and management's representation that the listing is complete. Randomly select five (5) computers and observe while management demonstrates that the selected computers have current and active antivirus software and that the operating system and accounting system software in use are currently supported by the vendor.

Results: Not applicable – testing not required in Year 2.

28. Procedure: Randomly select five (5) terminated employees [or all terminated employees if less than five (5)] using the list of terminated employees obtained in Payroll and Personnel procedure #19. Observe evidence that the selected terminated employees have been removed or disabled from the network.

Results: Not applicable – testing not required in Year 2.

- 29. Procedure: Using the five (5) randomly selected employees/officials from Payroll and Personnel procedure #17, obtain cybersecurity training documentation from management, and observe that the documentation demonstrates that the following employees/officials with access to the agency's information technology assets have completed cybersecurity training as required by R.S. 42:1267. The requirements are as follows:
 - Hired before June 9, 2020 completed the training; and



 Hired on or after June 9, 2020 – completed the training within 30 days of initial service or employment.

Results: Not applicable - testing not required in Year 2.

Prevention of Sexual Harassment

30. Procedure: Using the five (5) randomly selected employees/officials from Payroll and Personnel procedure #17, obtain sexual harassment training documentation from management, and observe that the documentation demonstrates each employee/official completed at least one (1) hour of sexual harassment training during the calendar year as required by R.S. 42:343.

Results: Sexual harassment requirements are not applicable to nonprofits.

31. Procedure: Observe that the Entity has posted its sexual harassment policy and complaint procedure on its website (or in a conspicuous location on the Entity's premises if the Entity does not have a website).

Results: Sexual harassment requirements are not applicable to nonprofits.

- **32. Procedure:** Obtain the Entity's annual sexual harassment report for the current fiscal period, observe that the report was dated on or before February 1, and observe that the report includes the applicable requirements of R.S. 42:344:
 - a) Number and percentage of public servants in the agency who have completed the training requirements;
 - b) Number of sexual harassment complaints received by the agency;
 - c) Number of complaints which resulted in a finding that sexual harassment occurred:
 - d) Number of complaints in which the finding of sexual harassment resulted in discipline or corrective action; and
 - e) Amount of time it took to resolve each complaint.

Results: Sexual harassment requirements are not applicable to nonprofits.
